

THE CAMPING EXPERIENCE

Camping in comfort in the spectacular Rock Islands is a truly unbeatable way to experience Palau. We have exclusive access to private beach camps, complete with walk-in tents, solar showers, bathroom facilities, and an alfresco dining area. By moving our camps from island to island, we experience more of Palau's beauty without traveling far each day—and our snorkeling sites are often just steps from our camp's beach! With sunset cocktails at dinner and the rhythmic sound of the waves lulling you to sleep in your tent, you will feel truly removed from the outside world.

ITINERARY DESIGN

With over 20 years of experience in Palau, we have perfected every aspect of our itinerary. We carefully plan trip dates around moon and tide cycles so that we visit each reef, marine lake, and waterfall at the ideal time. Each trip explores the lifecycle of local marine life, as we see organisms from their juvenile to adult stages. At the start of our trip, we visit protected shallows that house baby black-tip sharks and juvenile reef fish. Making our way to Palau's famous deep-water "Drop Off" by the end of the trip, we are surrounded by adult versions of these incredible creatures!

EXPERT TRIP LEADERS

Our Trip Leaders grew up in Palau, and they are true experts on these wondrous islands that they call home. Not only will you leave feeling as if you've had a crash course in marine biology, you will also become familiar with Palau's bird life, WWII history, and Micronesian culture.

CUISINE

When you wake up to fresh fruit, eggs, and bacon each morning, you'll forget you're camping on a remote beach! Our picnic-style lunches on postcard-worthy beaches allow for a perfect moment to relax between the days' activities. At the end the day, enjoy a glass of wine or cold beer, a dinner of fresh fish caught just that morning and a variety of fresh vegetables, all served in our alfresco dining area by our wonderful Palauan camp crew.

LIMITED TO 9 TRAVELERS

Our small group size—a maximum of 9 travelers—means you'll have an intimate and personalized experience both above and below the water. Larger groups can be chaotic (and unsafe in the water) and can often miss the chance to ask your guide questions or see them expertly point out the elusive reef creatures. Your Trip Leader is always nearby on this journey, along with our support boat.


MAGICAL ROCK ISLANDS

With full days of idyllic kayaking and snorkeling, as well as a scenic flight at the end of the adventure, you'll truly experience all aspects of these majestic, jungle-draped limestone islands, both above and below the water.

JELLYFISH LAKE

Palau is one of only two places in the world where jellyfish have evolved to be stingless. They have been geographically isolated in marine lakes, and thus have no natural predators. It's quite the surreal experience to be safely surrounded by millions of jellyfish!







JUNGLE WALKS

In addition to our in-water adventures, we also explore the islands on foot in search of waterfalls, ancient "Yap Stone Money," and World War II relics. Palau was a strategic base for the Japanese in World War II, and you'll see Japanese bunkers, sunken bomber planes, and battle sites throughout the trip. Our private campsites also give us incredible access to exploration on foot.





HISTORY

Palau was settled by the early Micronesians, and their history and culture thrive today. Our Trip Leaders will enthusiastically teach you about ancient traditions, including the Micronesian games for traditional sailing (which they compete in themselves!).

DAY 1 KOROR, PALAU

Flights arrive in the late evening in Koror, capital of the Republic of Palau. You will be met at the airport and transferred to the Palau Carolines Resort overlooking the blue Pacific...meals on your own


Please note that in order to arrive in Palau on Day 1, it is necessary to depart from the US at least one day prior.

DAY 2 KOROR / BABELDAOB ISLAND

In the morning we meet with the Trip Leader and head to the Palau International Coral Reef Center, where we'll review the geology, habitat types, and natural history of the archipelago. Enjoy a scenic charter flight over the pristine islands then drive to Babeldaob Island, the largest in the island nation of Palau. A short hike brings us to the Ngchesar Waterfalls, where we can take a dip in the upper pools, look for freshwater fish and shrimp in the "Queen's Pool," and enjoy a picnic lunch. Meeting our vehicle, we continue to explore Babeldaob with a visit to Aimeliik Bai, where we learn about Palau's history, culture, and artistic traditions and visit a traditional men's meeting house (bai). We return to the hotel in time to freshen up for our Welcome

Dinner. Overnight at the Palau Carolines Resort...BLD

Hiking Time: Approximately 1 hour







Please note: the charter flight is subject to cancellation due to weather or government regulations. We hope to be able to take this scenic flight, but in the case of non-operation, your internal airfare cost will be refunded.

Our Days in the Rock Islands: Our activities on these six days vary with the wind as well as group interests. We kayak approximately 4-5 hours per day, interspersed with snorkeling (1-2 hours), and short hikes (30-45 minutes). Our support boat allows us to access more remote sites and cover a greater

distance, and you can use it to opt out of some kayaking if you wish. Although we will visit all the places listed on the itinerary, we rarely follow the schedule as described exactly due to weather, tides, preferences of trip members, and other factors. Come prepared to be flexible!

DAY 3 ROCK ISLANDS: NIKKO BAY

The phenomenally beautiful Rock Islands are glittering emeralds scattered across a sapphire sea. These celebrated islands offer not just a spectacular natural setting but also

some of the richest marine biodiversity on the planet. For six days, we explore their extraordinary hidden network of marine lakes, mangrove channels, marine tunnels, tropical beaches, and marine caverns. Our first foray into this fascinating realm is Nikko Bay, sheltered by the castle-like limestone walls of the Rock Islands. The bay's

calm waters provide idyllic sea kayaking opportunities in rare "old-growth coral forests." Our kayak adventures begin with a paddle into a hidden world known as Disney Lake, entering by way of a marine tunnel that is only exposed at low tide. Here we discover reefs that are many thousands of years old, protected by limestone walls that prevent surge and wind from

disturbing the delicate marine environment. The big theme for this first day is geology, and these wondrous islands present a dramatic example of how an uplifted ancient reef eroded away into 300 islands, lakes, lagoons, undercuts, and archways. Our first camp is usually at a place known as Lee Marvin Beach, with its great birding and exotic night sounds (endemic owls and burrowing frogs!). Beautiful green sea turtles nest here

in season. Our private beach camp has walk-in tents with cots and sleeping pads, a toilet facility, a solar shower, and delicious multi-course meals...BLD

DAY 4 ROCK ISLANDS: RISONG BAY / BLUE DEVIL GARDENS / SALT-WATER WATERFALL

Marine lakes and isolated turquoise bays—each with its own unique

habitat—make amazing Risong Bay a sea kayaking paradise. This diverse day is a chance to focus on inner lagoon nursery habitats. Highlights include caves, drift snorkeling, an ancient Palauan village, and the absolutely pristine coral environments known as the Blue Devil Gardens, where sparkling blue devil damsel fish dance between the corals (so numerous they can be seen from our kayaks). Our grand finale today is an unbelievable sight—a salt-water waterfall spilling into a

turquoise oasis. One of the most bizarre phenomena in Palau, the waterfall is created as tidal waters flow out of an enclosed marine lake, spilling into Mandarin Fish Bay. Our snorkeling focus is on juvenile fish, and on our paddle excursions, we should see baby sharks and rays in tranquil little nursery bays. Overnight at camp...BLD

DAY 5 ROCK ISLANDS: MILKY WAY / EINSTEIN'S GARDENS

Today we snorkel over the wreck of a Zero fighter airplane from World War II, paddle across the cream-colored waters of a narrow channel that the locals call the Milky Way, and pass through a tunnel to secluded Secret Lake, surrounded by high limestone walls. The lake's underwater attractions

include cuttlefish and exquisite sponge life of every shape and color. Snorkel sites today include multicolored Einstein's Garden (so named for its proliferation of giant lobophyllia brain corals), fed by the 250-foot-long Tunnels of Doom. Themes of this day will be stunning beauty, sea birds, and local flora, including the leafless orchid. The gentle lapping of the waves at our camp helps put us to sleep. Overnight at camp... BLD







DAY 6 ROCK ISLANDS: LONG LAKE / HONEYMOON BEACH

A paddle excursion takes us to Long Lake, a place unique even by Palau standards, where the current carries our kayaks through crystal-clear waters beneath a mangrove canopy draped with hanging orchids and epiphytic ferns. We navigate

this winding passage into a milelong lake, a hidden oasis for nesting birds and baby fishes. Many of the ancient plants at the lake (cycads, for example) are not seen anywhere else in Palau—or anywhere else in the world for that matter. Baby eagle rays, turtles, and giant clams are found here, and the skies overhead are full of tropical avians, from white-tailed tropicbirds to white-breasted wood swallows. Afterwards, we head to the coral gardens at a place known as Honeymoon Beach, much more beautiful than any picture-postcard

beach, with its tiny sand spit and swaying coconut palms sandwiched between two limestone islands. The coral here is simply pristine. Overnight at camp...BLD

DAY 7 ROCK ISLANDS: GIANT CLAM BEACH / JELLYFISH LAKE / STONE MONEY

Paddling past isolated little beaches, we stop to inspect, refresh, and snorkel along the way. Two very memorable highlights today are Giant Clam Beach and Jellyfish Lake. Giant Clam Beach, home to Palau's largest bivalves, has stacks

of 500-pound clams simply piled on top of one another, and no one dares to touch these ancient leviathans, now protected in this marine preserve. We continue to Jellyfish Lake, a place truly beyond description—here, millions of non-stinging jellyfish bounce off our bodies as we snorkel among them. This is one of the only two places in the world where stingless jellyfish exist. Later, we make impromptu stops including a foray into the jungle to see hidden treasures that only Wilderness Travel trip members ever see! Overnight at camp...BLD



DAY 8 ROCK ISLANDS: BIG DROP-OFF

The Big Drop-Off, the common name for Palau's legendary Ngemelis Wall, is the culmination of all we've seen this week. Famed as the world's very best wall dive, it drops nearly 1,000













feet to the sea floor, with the upper reaches festooned with spectacular sea fans, coral whips, and sponges. Here we enjoy best-of-the-best snorkeling in crystal-clear seas with 100-foot visibility amid sharks, rays, turtles, and an overwhelming profusion of reef fish! Big Drop-Off is the place where we really come to understand Palau as the "underwater Serengeti"

of our planet. Tonight, our last night on the Rock Islands, we enjoy a traditional Palauan feast complete with seasonal catch-of-the-day seafood. Overnight at camp...BLD

DAY 9 PELELIU / KOROR

Motoring to scenic Peleliu, we have a fascinating day of exploring its World War II battle sites. After a picnic feast and some final snorkeling, we'll head back to Koror by boat. Tonight we gather for our Farewell Dinner. Overnight at the Palau Carolines Resort...BLD

DAY 10 KOROR / DEPART

The morning is free to enjoy the facilities at Palau Carolines Resort, or to explore Koror on your own. Check-out time is at 12:00 pm (noon). Transfer to the Koror Airport and depart on homeward-bound flights...B*

will transfer to the Koror Airport just
after the Farewell Dinner on Day 9,
to connect with flights departing early
morning on Day 10. However, if your

10, you will overnight in Koror on Day
9 and transfer to the Koror Airport the
following day.

To offer the lowest possible cost, our trips are priced according to the number of participants on the trip. All costs are per person, based on double occupancy. If you wish to have a single room, you must pay the single supplement fee. Please note that Wilderness Travel staff, or guests of Wilderness Travel such as travel writers, photographers, or leaders-intraining, are not included in the tier pricing count.

CURRENCY EXCHANGE RATE

Because the prices published for our program are set so far in advance of the trip dates, we are occasionally faced with exceptional cost increases and/or currency fluctuations that affect the actual cost of running the trip. In most years, no price changes are necessary. However, we do reserve the right to raise or lower the trip price if there is a significant change in costs or exchange rates. If this is the case, your final invoice will reflect the difference in trip cost.

Palau Extension—The "Big Five"

Our post-trip extension provides ample opportunities to see Palau's "Big Five"—pilot whales, spinner dolphins, dugongs, sharks, mantas—that are not normally seen in the areas we explore on our regular itinerary. Join us for what promises to be an exciting "safari" discovering some of Palau's most fascinating creatures!

DAY 1 DUGONGS AND CROCODILES

We meet in the morning and depart Koror by boat in search of crocodiles within the labyrinth of islands of Nikko Bay (in a different area than the one we explored on the main trip). After lunch in a secluded cove, we'll slip into kayaks with the hopes of paddling with dugongs, the only remaining species of the serenia, or moon creatures, distant aquatic relatives of the elephant. These slow-moving marine mammals graze on sea grass in shallow waters along coastlines in the Pacific and Indian Oceans. Their feeding style gives them their more common nickname: sea cow. We finish the day with a snorkel at Lolita's Coral Gardens. We return to the Palau Carolines Resort by speedboat. Dinner on your own and overnight at hotel...BL

DAY 2 CETACEANS

We're picked up by boat at 8:30 am and head out to the trenches on the east side of the archipelago, where we hope to find spinner dolphins. We have excellent chances to spot these creatures as we cruise along: they frolic in the bow wake of the boat and often hang around for 30 minutes or more. In-water experiences with the spinners tend to be brief and our attempts will be based exclusively on their behavior. The primary goal of our day is to spot pilot whales, melonheaded whales, false killer whales (all of these are known collectively as "Black Fish"), and potentially, sperm whales. All these cetaceans are highly social, ridiculously intelligent, and curious. In-water experiences will be based on surface conditions and each guest's confidence in the open-ocean environment. Additionally, we'll have hydrophones that help us pinpoint their locations. Return to Palau Carolines Resort for overnight...BL

DAY 3 MANTAS AND SHARKS

Today we head out through Ulong Channel and troll the open waters as we make our way to Ngemelis Island. Dolphin and whale encounters in this area are also quite common. We snorkel even more of the outer reef sites to include Shark City

and New Drop Off, which are typically not included in our regular itinerary. As the afternoon incoming tide rolls in, we'll slip in the water at German Channel to witness the barrel-rolling feeding behavior of giant mantas. During the mating season (highly variable, but typically covering about three months a year), the mantas collect in massive numbers and form what we call manta trains. All this feeding and courtship occurs just below the surface, so even snorkelers—and not just SCUBA divers—have good chances of witnessing this behavior. We return to the Palau Carolines Resort as the sun sets...BL

DAY 4 DEPART

Transfer to the airport for homeward-bound flight...B

PALAU CAROLINES RESORT

Koror, Palau Days 1 to 2 (2 nights), Day 9 (1 night)

Eight private bungalows with views of the rock islands across the bay are situated in a quiet spot where you'll awake to the warble of birds and the ocean breeze. Built from mahogany, mangrove, and bamboo, each bungalow features air conditioning, a separate sitting area, and a private bathroom. Several of the bungalows also have a private balcony. Walk along the jungle path to the terrace and bar, and enjoy a continental breakfast delivered to your door each morning.



PALAU CAMPS

The Rock Islands, Palau Days 3 to 8 (6 nights)

On the phenomenally beautiful Rock Islands, we enjoy our own wonderful campsites chosen for their beauty and access to fantastic snorkeling. Our private, full-service camps have walk-in tents, complete with cots, sheets, blankets and pillows, a toilet structure, solar shower, and a dining tent set with table and chairs. After full days of physical activity, we'll have good appetites, and our camp cooks provide delicious meals. Typical breakfasts include fresh papaya, pineapple, eggs, pancakes, or Palauan specialties. Lunch is usually picnic style, featuring sandwiches and fruit. Dinner is usually a beach barbecue with fresh-grilled fish or chicken, vegetables, and baked local desserts while we savor the sunset. Our support boat goes ahead to each new campsite with our gear so that our new camp is set up and awaiting our arrival.

Many flights depart Koror in the early morning (12:00 am to 5:00 am). A complimentary transfer will be provided from Palau Carolines Resort to the airport.

INTERNATIONAL AIR TRAVEL

You are responsible for making your own arrangements for flights to and from Palau. Most flights to Koror fly via Honolulu and Guam. United and Delta are the only major airlines that fly to Palau from the US. United offers daily flights that best match with trip dates; Delta schedules are limited to and from Palau. All flights usually arrive Koror in the evening/nighttime of Day 1. Please note that in order to arrive in Palau on Day 1 it is necessary to depart from the US at least one day prior.

The name on your airline ticket must match the name on your passport exactly, and your passport must be valid for at least six months after your date of return to the US.

Please do not purchase your tickets until you are confirmed on the trip. Once tickets are purchased, please forward a copy of your email flight confirmation from the airline. It is your responsibility to ensure your flight times coordinate with the arrival and departure logistics for this trip.

When she's not guiding, you'll find EliLai racing outrigger canoes for Palau's national women's team, constructing traditional Micronesian sailing canoes using local materials, or adventuring in the wilds of Idaho.

An adventurer at heart, Cobi also takes time to travel abroad to expand his horizons, delve into different cultures, and indulge in new cuisine. When not leading tours, you can find him outdoors on hikes, fishing trips to feed his family, or working on video posts. Cobi loves a good challenge, whether it's competing for his home state in Palau (Belau Games) or representing his country in competing in outrigger canoe races in Micronesia (Micro Games).

What the Trip is Like

TRIP LEVEL

This trip is rated a Level 3 (Moderate) according to our trip grading system.

Average Day

- 4-5 hours kayaking
- 1-3 hours snorkeling
- · Occasional short hikes

Challenge Days

Day 8: 2 hours kayaking including time in the open ocean (potentially with current), 4 hours snorkeling

How Tough is This Trip?

You need to be comfortable kayaking for up to 2 hours at a time and up to 5 hours in a day, and snorkeling in a variety of conditions, including drift snorkels with strong currents. While kayaking and snorkeling is usually at your own pace, it is sometimes necessary to be able to keep up with the group

GETTING IN SHAPE

For maximum enjoyment of the trip, you must be in good health and able to kayak and snorkel for multiple hours at a time. Previous kayaking and snorkeling experience is not required, however we recommend kayaking experience if possible.

If the paddling ends up being easier than you had expected, you will have the option of doing some extra kayaking or hiking in the afternoon after we reach camp. If it turns out to be more difficult than you had expected, you can opt out of kayaking for that day and ride along in the support boat. We have welcomed both beginner and experienced paddlers on this trip, and they have found sea kayaking to be a fantastic way to experience the wonders of Palau.

There are a few optional hikes, and if you would like to participate you will need to be comfortable hiking up limestone rocks and through narrow, slippery jungle paths.

WEATHER

Palau has a warm, humid tropical climate with some of the most uniform year-round temperatures in the world. The average humidity is a balmy 78 percent. Water temperatures range between 82 and 86°F. Rainfall can occur throughout the year, but is heaviest in June and July.

ACCOMMODATIONS

In Koror, we will stay in comfortable bungalows located up on a hill, with views of the jungle and the Rock Islands. While in the Rock Islands, we will stay at three different campsites, all of which are located on the beach. While not luxurious, they are comfortable and well located to begin each day's activities. There are walk-in tents with a cot and an inflatable mattress pad, a composting toilet facility, a solar shower strung from the palm trees, and a dining tent.

CUISINE

Breakfast and dinner are served at the campsites, and include a variety of Palauan and Western meals. Breakfasts usually include fresh fruit and eggs. Lunch is picnic-style and typically includes sandwiches. Dinner is usually a barbecue with freshcaught fish or chicken and vegetables. There are a variety of vegetarian options.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation on our Babeldoab tour is in an air conditioned van. Our kayaks are sit-on-top Mission XStream 400 Kayaks with carbon fiber paddles and high back seats. While kayaking and camping, there is a 33 foot Yamaha support boat with covered seating that we use to access the farther sites, and can also be used to opt out of kayaking or snorkeling.

OCEAN CONDITIONS

Most of our kayaking and sailing is in calm, protected waters. We have a few short crossings (both in the boat and on kayak) over the open ocean, and the sea can be rough if it is windy or stormy.

In general, we choose routes that are largely protected from high winds and strong currents, and we run the trips at the times of year when the weather is most reliable. We also adapt our daily schedule to local conditions.
