Because the primary focus of our trips has always been snorkeling (as opposed to diving), we're experts at finding Raja Ampat's best shallow reefs, and since we operate trips year round, we're adept at adjusting our daily schedule for changes in weather, tides, or currents (most other boats only come for a few weeks a year). We invite you to experience the spectacular reefs and hidden corners of this snorkeler's paradise with the experts!

LIMITED TO 10 TRAVELERS

Our small group size—a maximum of 10 travelers—means you'll have an intimate and personalized experience both above and below the water. Larger groups can be chaotic (and unsafe in the water) and you can often miss the chance to ask your guide questions or see the guide expertly point out the elusive reef creatures. With our small group, there are two or three guides in the water at all times, depending on the number of snorkelers, which means you can snorkel at your own pace, and our crew is always nearby in case you want return to the boat early.

CRUISE IN TRADITIONAL INDONESIAN STYLE

Built in traditional Indonesian schooner style, our sailing ship adds charm to your experience. While not luxurious, she has all the comforts needed for your time in Raja Ampat, including air conditioning, cabins with en suite bathrooms, cold drinks on hand, and space to relax on deck. The intimate size of the boat allows navigation into remote bays for calm nighttime anchorages and we can get you to the snorkeling sites with just a few minutes' dinghy ride.

EXPERT NATURALIST TRIP LEADERS

Our Trip Leaders have been living and working in Indonesia for decades and are expert naturalists. Before you slip into the water for each snorkeling adventure, they will give you a briefing of what you are likely to see. Once you're in the water, they help you find everything from tiny nudibranchs to camouflaged wobbegong sharks, and each night they follow up with fascinating presentations on the biodiversity of Raja Ampat—you'll leave feeling like you've gotten a crash course in marine biology! Their passion for the remote world of Raja Ampat is infectious.

OUR COMMITMENT TO CONSERVATION

WT offsets all carbon emissions for your trip from the time you land to the time you leave. We also support (and encourage our travelers to donate to) Bye Bye Plastic Bags, an Indonesian NGO run by two passionate Balinese teenagers. Why Snorkel in Raja Ampat?

AN EPICENTER OF MARINE BIODIVERSITY

Raja Ampat is an unparalleled underwater realm in the heart of the Coral Triangle. Called an epicenter of marine biodiversity, it is home to over 1,500 species of fish and 500 species of coral reef and greatly surpasses areas like the Great Barrier Reef and Caribbean in its bounty. In fact, Raja Ampat holds the world record for most species of fish recorded in a single dive, with an astonishing 284 (roughly one new species every five seconds)! This incredible biodiversity means you'll not only see a kaleidoscope of color and critters but also have the opportunity to come face to face with some of the most exciting animals in the ocean, including manta rays, whales, dolphins, sharks, and turtles.





WORLD-CLASS DESTINATION FOR SNORKELING & MORE Raja Ampat is widely held as the best place in the world for coral reef snorkeling, with its remote location, crystal-clear waters, and unbelievably pristine and healthy reefs. Snorkeling is the major focus of our trip, with two or three fantastic snorkeling sessions each day, but your journey also allows time to explore secluded beaches, look for endemic species on shore including the red bird of paradise, and hike jungled paths to panoramic island viewpoints. You can also kayak, paddleboard, or just relax on deck and soak up the otherworldly scenery.

A SECLUDED PARADISE

Raja Ampat remains one of the last places on earth that has proven resilient to global climate change. Various factors contributing to this include its thermally tolerant coral, which have adapted to warmer waters over time, and its remote location in the Pacific, where it remains largely untouched by human development. On your WT adventure, there will likely be several days where you may not see a single other boat, and you'll feel as if you have this untouched paradise to yourself.

Itinerary

DAY 1 SORONG, INDONESIA / EMBARK

Arrive at Domine Eduard Osok Airport in Sorong, where we are met by our Trip Leader. We'll either board in Sorong or take a fast ferry to our yacht in Waisai, the capital of Raja Ampat on Waigeo Island, for our Welcome Lunch. After a boat briefing, we head off into the heart of the Dampier Strait for an afternoon snorkel on the island of Friwinbonda, where the hard coral reefs are teeming with reef fish. This evening, our Trip Leader will offer a presentation on the rich biodiversity of the Raja Ampat region. Overnight on board...LD

Please be aware that this itinerary is designed to be flexible. Although we will visit all the places listed on the itinerary, we rarely follow the schedule as described exactly due to weather, tides, preferences of trip members, and other factors. Come prepared to be flexible!

During the trip, the Trip Leaders will give various presentations on topics such as Raja Ampat's geology, coral reef fish, biodiversity, limestone ecosystems, and avian life, depending on group interests.

Raja Ampat: Lying west of sparsely populated West Papua province, the Raja Ampat Islands are in the heart of the Coral Triangle, the world's richest area for coral reefs (the triangle includes Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, the Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste, and Papua New Guinea). These sheer-sided, mushroom-shaped islands scattered across azure seas were explored in the mid-19th century by Alfred Russel Wallace, a contemporary of Darwin and co-founder of the theory of natural selection. Raja Ampat means "four kings," a name dating to the 15th century, when the Sultan of Tidore appointed four local rajas for the four main islands. Raja Ampat was not explored in detail until a 2001 survey by an international team of marine biologists working with Conservation International.

They recorded 450 species of hard corals (more than half of the world's total species), four new species of fish, seven new species of coral, more than 950 species of reef fish, and the highest number (283) of fish species visually recorded during a single dive in the Indo-Pacific. To protect the amazing biodiversity of these islands, efforts are underway to have them declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

DAY 3 PENEMU ISLAND / JEFF NABI

After our morning snorkel, we enjoy some kayaking or paddle boarding beneath the sheer limestone cliffs. We return to the boat for a warm lunch to refuel, then head off for our afternoon snorkel to the secluded island of Jeff Nabi Kecil. Here we enjoy some of the largest table corals in Raja Ampat. After a short afternoon sail, we tie off the

boat in a remote mangrove-lined bay on the island of Batang Pele. We'll enjoy the evening songs of birds as the sun sets. Overnight on board...BLD

Biodiversity: These remarkable islands are home to unusual marine and terrestrial ecosystems, habitat, and niches. There are shallow bays with rare shrimp gobies, octopuses, nudibranchs and "twilight zone" critters, narrow lagoon channels overhung by rainforest, and limestone rock islands



DAY 2 DAMPIER STRAIT / PENEMU ISLAND

We have breakfast en route to Mansuar Island for our morning snorkel under the village jetty, where we have our first chances to enjoy large schools of barracudas, turtles, and soft corals growing on the pillars of the jetty. We return to the boat to enjoy lunch while we sail to Penemu, a group of islands on the western edge of the Dampier Strait. Our Penemu anchorage is in a beautiful bay surrounded by vertical limestone cliffs. An afternoon snorkel brings us to beautiful, shallow Acropora undercut by the sea and covered with a kaleidoscope of tunicates, sponges, and corals. There are also offshore reefs where currents support an unbelievable variety of colorful corals, sea turtles, and fish, including wobbegong sharks, reef sharks, barracuda, and three species of pygmy seahorses (Hippocampus bargibanti, H. denise, and the newly discovered H. pontohi).

DAY 4 KAWE / WAYAG ISLAND

We start the day searching for crocodiles in the mangroves before heading off for our first exhilarating snorkel on Eagle Rock in search of manta rays and wobbegongs. Back on board, a two-hour sail brings us north to Wayag. En route we listen for the sound of the ship's horn as we cross the equator. Wayag is absolutely stunning, with the ultimate

"dream island" setting of jungle-covered rock outcrops and waters of every imaginable shade of blue and green. There are countless small islets interspersed among the larger islands of the Wayag group. We spend our afternoon snorkeling in search of giant clams and take a hike up the limestone cliffs for a breathtaking view of the sun setting over the lagoons. Overnight on board...BLD DAY 5 WAYAG ISLAND

With a full day at Wayag, we drift-snorkel along the lagoon channels, beachcomb on the deserted white-sand beaches, and tour the hidden lagoons by dinghy in search of orchids, juvenile sharks, and rays. We'll explore these incredible rock islands by kayak or paddleboard, weaving between the karst

> limestone islets. After a picnic lunch on the beach, we visit more of Wayag's reefs and take a short hike to another inlet in search of birds and juvenile fish along the way. Overnight on board... BLD

DAY 6 WAYAG / URANIE ISLAND

After another relaxing morning snorkeling around Wayag's beaches, we get back on board for lunch and a short cruise to Uranie Island. At Uranie

Island, our anchorage is in a stunning beach-lined bay with small rock islands and reefs. We snorkel the reefs and make a short scramble up the limestone to the top of the island for a spectacular 360-degree view of Uranie Bay and Raja Ampat's beautiful waters (this hike is difficult and only for surefooted people!). Later, there is plenty of opportunity to kayak, beachcomb, or birdwatch on the outer beaches of the bay. Overnight on board...BLD





DAY 7 BAG ISLAND / ALYUI BAY (WAIGEO ISLAND)

Waking up in the beautiful Uranie Bay, we take a short dinghy ride to Bag Island for our morning snorkel. Here we enjoy the pristine hard-coral reefs and crystal-clear waters full of reef fish. During lunch, we head to our next destination, Alyui Bay, on the west side of Waigeo Island. Our afternoon snorkel takes us into the mysterious world of invertebrates as we drift

through the forest-lined waterways of the bay. We enjoy the sunset in this incredibly scenic bay, listening to the chorus of parrots, hornbills, and herons as they come home to rest for the night. Overnight on board...BLD

DAY 8 ALYUI BAY (WAIGEO) / WOFOH

Our morning snorkel in "Spooky

Channel" (so named because of the towering limestone walls on either side) is a drift through an abundance of soft corals and sea fans. We hop in the dinghy to explore the wide diversity of marine life, hidden lagoons, and mangroves. During lunch, we move south to the remote islands of Wofoh, a small group of islands off the shores of Waigeo, for an afternoon snorkel on another of Raja Ampat's stunning and diverse coral reefs. Overnight on board...BLD

DAY 9 WAIGEO / GAM ISLAND

Cruising the lagoons, we explore mangroves and snorkel the passage separating Waigeo and Gam Island, which was first discovered by the British naturalist Alfred Russell Wallace, who visited this area in 1860 and is one of the "forgotten fathers" of the theory of natural selection and evolution. We have a chance to explore more by kayak or dingy at our

> own pace for a different perspective of this tropical paradise. The islands of Waigeo and Batanta are home to the Wilson's bird-of-paradise and the red bird-of-paradise, both endemics, as well as hundreds of other bird species. Lorikeets, parrots, kingfishers, eagles, and hornbills are commonly seen. Before sunset, we have the chance to walk in the village and take

a 30-minute hike up the hill in search of the red bird-ofparadise, first made known to the world by Alfred Russell Wallace, who collected them along with other specimens on his journeys through the Indonesian archipelago. Overnight on board...BLD

Alfred Russel Wallace: Wallace (1823–1913) was one of the most remarkable scientific travelers, naturalists, and thinkers



of the 19th century. His independent proposal of a theory of evolution by natural selection, which he sent to Charles Darwin for review in 1858, prompted Charles Darwin to reveal his own more developed but unpublished theory of evolution that he had worked on for 20 years. From 1854

to 1862, Wallace traveled through Indonesia and Malaysia and collected large numbers of previously unknown birds, mammals, and insects. His observations of the marked zoological differences across a narrow zone in the Indonesian archipelago led to his hypothesis of the zoogeographical boundary now known as the Wallace Line, the divide between two great zoogeographic regions, the Oriental



TRADITIONAL INDONESIAN SCHOONER

Our vessel is a double-masted traditional Indonesian sailboat that offers the unique opportunity to explore the incredibly remote, unique, and mystical Raja Ampat archipelago. The boat was built in Sulawesi in 2000 out of Indonesian hardwoods and is 100 feet long with a 21-foot beam. While not luxurious, she is comfortable, well maintained. There are six double cabins with en suite bathrooms, individually controlled air-conditioning, and electricity 24 hours a day. The boat is very sturdy and stable, whether still or under motor. The boat's crew of seven is attentive, experienced, and helpful, and many have worked on the boat for years. Note: There are four cabins below deck, and two cabins on the main deck (where the dining room and common areas are located). Please note that the cabins below deck require descending steep stairs/ladders, and that the cabins above deck are slightly smaller.

YOGYAKARTA EXTENSION

Yogyakarta is situated almost exactly halfway along the length of Java, in an area considered by the Javanese to be the heartland of the country. It's home to some of the island's most spectacular scenery and oldest traditions. On this extension, you'll be immersed in the cultural capital of Java, with many influences from Hindu and Buddhist traditions to Dutch colonial designs. Enjoy a sunrise visit to the world's largest Buddhist monument, take a music lesson or batik dyeing class, and you even have the option for a Jeep excursion. This extension can be taken either before or after your main trip.

BALI EXTENSION

Sculpted by dense tropical forests and dramatic coastlines famous for their waves, Bali shelters a unique combination of natural beauty and vibrant culture. This extension to the "land of the gods" whisks you to the lush artist's haven of Ubud, where you'll walk amid cascading rice terraces and sample Balinese specialties. Your guide will introduce you to local artisans and farmers and you'll have the opportunity to witness ceremony dances and visit tranquil temples. For those looking for an extra thrill, you have the option to dine 150 feet in the air during a hot-air balloon ride or rush down the white waters on a rafting excursion. Suggested Airport: Sorong Airport (SOQ) Suggested Date & Time: Day 1, before 8:00 am

We HIGHLY recommend arriving in Sorong one day prior to Day 1 of the trip. For extra nights in Sorong, we recommend booking the Swiss-Belhotel (<u>www.swiss-belhotel.com</u>). If you arrive early, please make your way to the hotel on your own.

On Day 1 of the trip you will meet the group in the lobby of the Swiss-Belhotel at 9:00 am.

Please note that Sorong has very little tourism infrastructure, so there are not many pre-trip hotel options. Hotels are basic and not up to high Western standards.

A morning transfer will be provided to the Sorong airport in time to check in for departing flights.

A NOTE ABOUT INTERNATIONAL ARRIVAL/ DEPARTURE PORT IN INDONESIA

While it is possible to fly to Sorong from other locations in Indonesia, we suggest Jakarta since it has the most frequent schedule of flights to Sorong. Airlines with schedules to Jakarta include Singapore Airlines, Cathay Pacific, EVA Air, and United Airlines.

INTERNATIONAL AIR TRAVEL

You are responsible for making your own arrangements for flights to and from Sorong, Indonesia. There are many online consolidators for booking travel, but for more personal help arranging air transport, you can contact Exito Travel at 1-800-655-4053 in the US or 1-800-670-2605 in Canada. They are very adept at putting flight itineraries together, to even the most far-flung places. More information can be found at <u>www.</u> <u>exitotravel.com</u>.

Depending on your routing, it is necessary to depart from the US two or possibly three days prior to Day 1 of the trip itinerary. The name on your airline ticket must match the name on your passport exactly, and your passport must be valid for at least six months after your date of return to the US.

Please do not purchase your tickets until you are confirmed on the trip. Once your tickets have been purchased, please

send us a copy of your airline schedule. It is your responsibility to ensure your flight times coordinate with the arrival and departure logistics for this trip.

While Garuda may be more expensive than other airlines, it is by far the most reliable, with the fewest delays and cancellations. Also, guests flying through Jakarta on Garuda do not need to transfer from the domestic airport to the international terminal, which saves a lot of time especially if you have short connection times. Garuda also allows an extra 66 lbs of luggage.

What the Trip is Like

TRIP LEVEL

This trip is rated a Level 3 (Moderate) according to our trip grading system.

Average Day

- 4-6 hours snorkeling
- 3-4 hours sailing

• Occasional kayaking, paddle boarding, and short-moderate hikes

Challenge Days

Day 4: 4-5 hours snorkeling, including 2 hours in an area with extremely strong current, 3-4 hours sailing, and 1 hour hike

How Tough is This Trip?

You need to be comfortable snorkeling in a variety of conditions, including drift snorkels and occasionally against strong currents. While snorkeling is usually at your own pace, it is sometimes necessary to be able to keep up with the group.

TERRAIN

There are a few short, steep hikes. The limestone is very sharp, and you will sometimes need to use your hands for balance. There are also muddy sections that can be slippery.

GETTING IN SHAPE

For maximum enjoyment of the trip, you must be in good health and able to snorkel for multiple hours at a time. We highly recommend that you have previous snorkeling experience. There are a few optional hikes, and if you would like to participate you will need to be comfortable hiking up slippery, muddy jungle floor and steep limestone rocks using your hands for support.

WEATHER

Raja Ampat is near the Equator and has a warm tropical climate, with year-round temperatures in the low 80s and occasional rain showers. Water temperatures range from 83 to 86°F.

CUISINE

The cook on board prepares simple and tasty meals, a mix of Asian and Western styles with seafood and plenty of fruit and vegetables. There is bread and fruit available for breakfast, as well as eggs on request. Lunch and dinner are served as a group, and snacks are available. There are plenty of vegetarian options.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation to/from the ferry is in an air-conditioned van. The ferry to/from Waisai is air-conditioned and takes about 2 hours. During the snorkels and land excursions, we will take a small dinghy to each site. The dinghy will always stay with the group so that you can return to the boat at any time.

OCEAN CONDITIONS

The seas are generally calm in Raja Ampat, but unexpected squalls or high winds can create rough ocean conditions at any time. There is a higher chance of rough seas on Days 4 and 6 when our crossing takes place in the open ocean. The remainder of the sailing is in much more protected waters, and sea sickness is typically not a problem.

MEDICAL ATTENTION AND EVACUATION IN REMOTE DESTINATIONS

The Raja Ampat journey takes place in an extremely remote and uninhabited archipelago in the Pacific. In the case of serious illness or injury, medical attention and swift evacuation are not available. Once we sail from Sorong, we are far away from towns and medical facilities. In the case of serious illness or injury, we will make every effort to reach medical facilities as soon as possible, but be aware that it may take the boat days to return to the port of Sorong. If you have health or medical issues of concern, please discuss them with your physician before considering this trip.

EQUIPMENT

We require that trip members bring their own snorkeling equipment (mask, snorkel, and fins) to ensure a proper fit. There are occasional cold currents in Raja Ampat, so we recommend a 3mm wetsuit if you get cold easily, or at least a lycra skin for sun and stinger protection.
