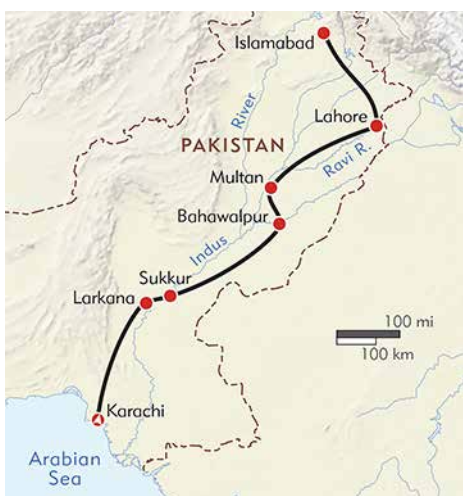

Southern Pakistan’s Indus Valley is a realm of incredibly ancient civilizations, vast deserts, Sufi tombs, glorious Moghul architecture, and stunning UNESCO World Heritage Sites including Makli Hill, Mohenjo-Daro, and Harappa. Some of the world’s oldest cities are found in these lands where the armies of the Moghul Empire and Alexander the Great once marched. From Karachi, we head to our first World Heritage Site, the Makli Hills, one of the largest necropolises in the world. At Larkana, we visit Lal Shahbaz Qalandar, a beautiful testament to a revered 13th century Sufi saint and poet. At ancient Mohenjo-Daro, we explore the largest Indus Valley Civilization settlement and the best preserved in South Asia, with 5,000 years of history. Further travels bring us to historic Bahawalpur, home to 17 Sufi shrines, and to the massive 9th century Derawar Fort in the Cholistan Desert. In Lahore, we’ll visit the old Walled City, and on the Pakistan-India border at Wagah, we’ll witness the famous daily flag-lowering ceremony, with its dance-like marches. We finish up in Pakistan’s capital, Islamabad, with a visit to Taxila, the pivotal archaeological site of three significant cities and ancient Buddhist monasteries. Join us for a truly unique cultural adventure!

DAY 1, KARACHI, PAKISTAN

Arrive at the Karachi airport, where you'll be met for a transfer to the Karachi Marriott Hotel. After settling in, we gather for lunch, then head out to visit Zaibunnisa Street and Zainab Market, Karachi's vibrant bazaars, with their colonial-era buildings and jewelry and clothing shops. We gather for our Welcome Dinner tonight. Overnight at the Karachi Marriott Hotel...LD

Driving Time: 45 minutes

DAY 2, NATIONAL MUSEUM OF PAKISTAN / STATE BANK MUSEUM / MOHATTA PALACE MUSEUM

We begin our day with a visit to the National Museum of Pakistan, where numerous galleries feature artifacts from the prehistory of the region. We'll also visit the State Bank Museum of Pakistan, a curated collection of ancient currencies and rare artifacts. The museum also has a gallery and gift shop displaying the works of Sadequain, a renowned Pakistani artist. Later, we explore the Mohatta Palace Museum near Clifton Beach. The palace was built in 1927 and has a unique collection of art and textiles. Afterwards, we'll have an option to shop at Karachi's Dolmen Mall or return directly to the hotel. Dinner and overnight at hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 1 hour, 13 miles

DAY 3, QAUID-E-AZAM HOUSE / EMPRESS MARKET / MUHAMMAD ALI JINNAH MAUSOLEUM

Today finds us visiting the Quaid-e-Azam house, meticulously curated to honor the private life and achievements of Muhammad Ali Jinnah, the revered founder

of Pakistan's independence movement and the country's first leader. We'll also visit colonial-era Frere Hall, now housing an art gallery. Continuing to Empress Market, we'll find a vibrant bazaar constructed during the British Raj era and dedicated to Queen Victoria. Vendors here display ware from vegetables and spices to textiles and handicrafts. Our final visit today is to the Muhammad Ali Jinnah Mausoleum, constructed of white marble and adorned with Islamic architectural motifs. Overnight at the Karachi Marriott Hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 30 minutes, 5 miles

DAY 4, MAKLI HILLS / THATTA / HYDERABAD

A half-day drive brings us to Hyderabad to visit the Makli Hills, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the largest necropolises in the world. It boasts a myriad of tombs of the kings, saints, and luminaries of the Sindh Province, all expressed in a variety of architectural styles. Nearby is the ancient city of Thatta, the medieval capital of Sindh and seat of power for three successive dynasties. At this World Heritage Site, we'll visit the Shah Jahan Mosque, built in 1647, during the reign of Mughal emperor Shah Jahan and given by him as a gift to the people of Sindh for their hospitality. Its intricate tilework and rare geometric brickwork are rare for its era. After lunch at Keenjhar Lake, we continue to Hyderabad and settle into the Indus Hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 4.5 hours, 125 miles

DAY 5, LAL SHAHBAZ QALANDAR / LARKANA

On our overland journey to Larkana today, we'll visit the shrine of Lal Shahbaz Qalandar, a testament to this revered Sufi saint, poet, and philosopher of the 13th century. Both Hindus and Muslims respect him as he advocated for tolerance. His shrine receives over a million visitors a year from diverse religious backgrounds. The architectural design of the shrine combines Islamic and Indo-Arabic styles, with vibrant colors, intricate tilework, and geometric pattern. It includes a courtyard, mosque, madrasa (religious school), and Lal Shahbaz Qalandar's mausoleum. Overnight at Sambara Inn in Larkana...BLD

Driving Time: 6 hours, 200 miles

DAY 6, MOHENJO-DARO / SUNSET BOAT RIDE ON THE INDUS / SUKKUR

A morning drive brings us to the impressive archaeological site of Mohenjo-Daro. Built around 2,500 BCE, it was one of the largest settlements of the ancient Indus Valley Civilization and is one of the earliest major cities of the world, generally regarded as a capital of an extensive state. We'll explore its various features, including the great bath, granary, college square, pillared hall, private homes, and then visit the Mohenjo-Daro Museum. Evidence suggests that Mohenjo-Daro suffered more than once from devastating floods from the Indus, leading to speculation that ancient Harappa, which we visit on Day 12, may have succeeded or at least outlasted it. The day's activities also include a boat ride at sunset on the Indus River. Overnight at Hotel One in Sukkur...BLD

Driving Time: 3.5 hours, 85 miles

DAY 7, KOT DIJI FORT / FAIZ MAHAL PALACE / KHAIRPUR

Today we'll explore the Kot Diji archaeological area, an ancient site that was an important part of Indus Valley Civilization, and visit the 18th century Kot Diji Fort, located on the top of an imposing massif above the Indus River and one of Pakistan's World Heritage Sites. After lunch, we head to the imposing Faiz Mahal Palace, built as the sovereign's court for the Talpur monarchs of the Khairpur dynasty. The Faiz Mahal Palace is the seat of the former princely state of Khairpur. If Prince Mir Mehdi, the ruler's son and representative, is available at the time of our visit, he will discuss his family's heritage and the illustrious history of Khairpur. We return to Sukkur for overnight...BLD

Driving Time: 3 hours, 64 miles

DAY 8, UCH SHARIF / BAHAWALPUR

On the way to Bahawalpur, we'll stop at Uch Sharif, a historic town that boasts the picturesque remains of 17 Sufi shrines adorned with tiles. The most notable among them is the 14th century tomb of the Sufi saint Jalaluddin Bukhari and its associated mosque, surrounded by tombs dedicated to Bukhari's associates and relatives. Following lunch, we continue to the city of Bahawalpur. It was established in 1748 for the Abbasi family of nawabs (rulers), who were Muslim nobles. Set between an agricultural region watered by Sutlej

River Valley and the arid Cholistan Desert, Bahawalpur exudes a laid-back ambiance. Its landscape includes former palaces intertwined with tree-lined streets. Overnight at the Hotel One is Bahawalpur...BLD

Driving Time: 6 hours, 250 miles

DAY 9, BAHAWALPUR / DERAWAR FORT / CHOLISTAN DESERT

Our day begins with a full-day tour of Bahawalpur, including a drive out to the Cholistan Desert, famous for its remote forts and traditional camel races. The Cholistan Desert is the western part of India's Thar Desert. Archaeological evidence suggests that this area was inhabited by an ancient Indus Valley culture. Numerous forts were built across the desert landscape to house travelers and we'll visit one of them, the massive 9th century Derawar Fort, with 40 round towers over 100 feet high. Built by Rai Jajja Bhatti, a Rajput ruler, the fort has witnessed centuries of history and numerous dynasties. Over time, it has passed through the hands of various rulers, including the Abbasis, the Ghaznavids, and the Bahawalpur nawabs. Today it is a World Heritage Site. Dinner and overnight at the Hotel One...BLD

Driving Time: 4.5 hours, 125 miles

DAY 10, BAHAWALPUR MUSEUM / MULTAN

Before we depart Bahawalpur, we'll visit the renowned Abbasi family library, a treasure trove of literature and historical manuscripts, and the Bahawalpur Museum, where artifacts and relics narrate the region's rich history through intricate pottery and ornate jewelry, each piece a testament to Bahawalpur's cultural legacy. After lunch, we continue to the city of Multan, known for its traditional craft of blue ceramics. We'll stop at a place that features this pottery. Overnight at the Ramada Hotel in Multan...BLD

Driving Time: 3 hours, 68 miles

DAY 11, SUFI TOMBS / HUSSAIN AGAHI BAZAAR

Today we visit the tomb of Sheik Baha-ud-din Zakariya as well as that of Shah Rukn-e-Alam, an eminent Sufi saint from Multan. His tomb is a pilgrimage site, drawing over 100,000 pilgrims a year. Our day's exploration also includes visiting the lively Hussain Agahi Bazaar, a huge market full of local color. Overnight at the Ramada Hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 1.5 hours, 18 miles

DAY 12, HARAPPA / LAHORE

We make an early start for our day's drive to Lahore, capital of the Punjab. Along our route, we'll visit Harappa, one of the world's earliest cities, founded over 5,000 years ago. Along with Mohenjo-Daro, Harappa is one of the key sites of Indus Valley Civilization, also known as the Harappan Civilization, which extended from modern-day northeast Afghanistan to Pakistan and northwest India. It flourished between 3,300 BCE and 1,300 BCE, marked by advanced city planning, organized governance, and an intricate understanding of trade and artisanship. The first excavations of the Harappa ruins didn't happen until the 1920s in what was then the Punjab province of British India and is now in Pakistan. Before the excavations, scholars thought that Indian civilization had begun in the Ganges valley as Aryan immigrants from Persia and Central Asia populated the region around 1250 BCE. The discovery of Harappan cities moved the timeline back another 1,500 years. Overnight at the Avari Hotel in Lahore...BLD

Driving Time: 7 hours, 265 miles

DAY 13, LAHORE'S WALLED CITY / BADSHAHI MOSQUE / LAHORE FORT

Exploring Lahore's old Walled City is a rewarding experience and here we'll find the beautiful Wazir Khan Mosque, the Shahi Hammam (Royal Bath), and the famous 17th century Badshahi Mosque, a massive World Heritage-listed monument built of marble in grand Mughal style. We'll also explore Lahore Fort, locally known as Shahi Qilla, built in 1631 by the Moghul emperor Shah Jahan. Now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, it has several pavilions, including the Palace of Mirrors. We'll also visit a 19th century building commemorating the founder of the short-lived Sikh empire,

Maharaja Ranjit Singh. Overnight at the Avari Hotel in Lahore...BLD

Driving Time: 1 hour, 8 miles

DAY 14, LAHORE MUSEUM / SHALIMAR GARDENS / WAGAH BORDER CEREMONY

At the Lahore Museum, Pakistan's largest museum, established in 1894, we'll see fine examples of Mughal and Sikh doorways and woodwork, along with an extensive collection of paintings dating back to the Mughal, Sikh, and British periods. The museum also features collections of musical instruments, ancient jewelry, textiles, pottery, and armor. We'll spend the afternoon at the Shalimar Gardens, dating from the time of the Mughal Empire. This World Heritage-listed site was created as a Persian paradise in which humans co-exist in harmony with nature. In the late afternoon, we head to the Wagah border to witness the famous daily flag-lowering event known as the Beating Retreat Border Ceremony. The security forces of India and Pakistan have jointly performed this elaborate drill daily since 1959. As guards on each side compete with rapid, dance-like maneuvers and try to outdo each other, the flags are lowered and there is flamboyant pageantry and cheering from the crowds on both sides of the border. Overnight at the Avari Hotel in Lahore...BLD

Driving Time: 2 hours, 40 miles

DAY 15, KITAS TEMPLE COMPLEX / ISLAMABAD

Today's drive brings us to Pakistan's capital, Islamabad. Along the way, we explore the ancient Hindu temples at Kitas, featuring interconnected temples linked by walkways. It is believed that the temples date back to the Mahabharata era, making them over a thousand years old. According to Hindu mythology, the site is associated with the Pandava brothers, heroes of the Mahabharata, and the temples are said to have been built in their honor. We continue to Islamabad and check into the Serena Hotel for overnight...BLD

Driving Time: 6.5 hours, 260 miles

DAY 16, TAXILA / RAWALPINDI BAZAAR

A morning trip from Islamabad brings us to Taxila, a pivotal archaeological site in the Indian sub-continent. It boasts the remnants of three significant cities and numerous Buddhist monasteries dating from 600 BCE to AD 600. Positioned strategically at the crossroads of trade routes connecting China, India, Central Asia, and the West, Taxila became a cultural hub of the ancient world, enduring through various empires. The region embraced Buddhism around 275 BCE, becoming a catalyst for the spread of the religion to Central Asia, Tibet, and China. We'll visit the Taxila Museum, with its exquisite Gandharan sculptures and art, and see pivotal artifacts and discoveries from ancient civilizations. We'll also visit the important Buddhist stupa at Dharmarajika and the ancient city of Sirkap. After lunch, we return to Islamabad to tour the famous Raja Bazaar of Rawalpindi before returning to the Serena Hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 2.5 hours, 53 miles

DAY 17, ISLAMABAD

After a leisurely morning, we take a city tour, starting at the Heritage Museum, also known as Lok Virsa, managed by the National Institute of Folk & Traditional Heritage. Perched on the Shakarparian Hills, the museum provides a glimpse of the nation's rich heritage under one roof. We'll also tour the area around the capital's government buildings, including the Supreme Court of Pakistan, the Prime Minister's house, the Parliament building, and the Presidential Palace, culminating at the Faisal Mosque, named for the king of Saudi Arabia, who funded its construction. The mosque was designed by Turkish architect Vedat Dalokay and showcases modern designs while adhering to Islamic principles. One feature is the 8-sided main halls, reminiscent of an Arab desert tent rather than the traditional round dome. Tonight we gather for our festive Farewell Dinner. Overnight at the Serena Hotel...BLD

Driving Time: 1 hour, 15 miles

DAY 18, DEPART

What to Expect

WHAT THE TRIP IS LIKE

This trip is rated Level 2, Easy to Moderate, according to our trip grading system. While the trip is not expected to be physically strenuous, the long travel days and transportation conditions may be demanding. Accommodations are in good city hotels, and overland travel is in minivans and small buses, depending upon the size of the group. Road conditions can be very basic, and trip members should be prepared for some long drives. We believe that the most important requirements are a spirit of adventure and the understanding that you are visiting a fascinating region. This is not designed as a hiking trip, but we do hope to have a few exploration walks of several hours during the journey

WEATHER

The Indus Valley had a semi-arid to arid climate, with significant variation in precipitation. Temperatures fluctuate between the extremes, from near-freezing in the winter to extremely hot during the summer. Annual rainfall is scant. We plan our journey for the ideal month of January, when temperatures are cool but pleasant.
