Rather than use crowded pop-top minibuses that can't go off-road, we use rugged extended cab 4x4s with three rows of seats for only 5 passengers and a separate roof hatch for each row of seats. This allows you delightful personal space with unobstructed views and an ideal vantage for getting great photos.

In addition to our phenomenal daily game drives, we've woven a variety of other activities into the experience, from off-road travel in our sturdy 4x4s to exciting game walks, night drives, fascinating cultural encounters with the Maasai, a visit to Mary Leakey's Olduvai Gorge, a day in the legendary Ngorongoro Crater, and a private charter flight that avoids a long drive and offers the likely chance of spectacular aerial views of the Great Migration.

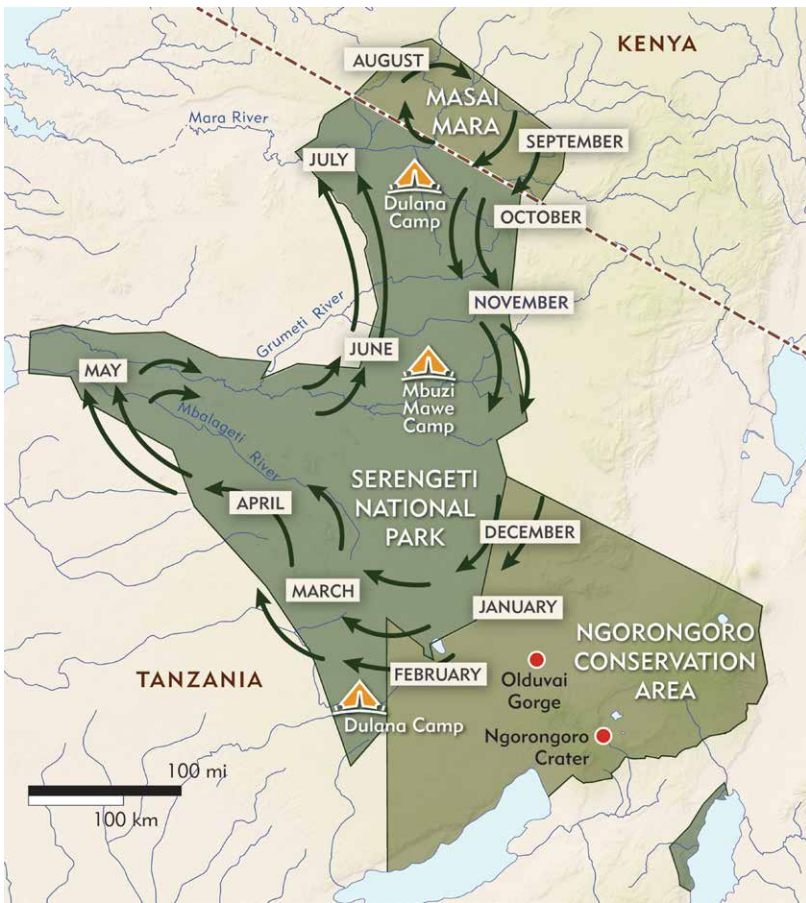
The Serengeti Migration

WHAT IS THE GREAT MIGRATION?

The Great Migration is the largest mass movement of land mammals on Earth, when more than a million wildebeest—along with hundreds of thousands of zebra and gazelle, stalked by predators like big cats and hyenas—circle through the Serengeti plains in Tanzania and Masai Mara Reserve in Kenya.

Following instinct and the scent of moisture, the herds move clockwise from their calving grounds in the lush plains of the southern Serengeti, moving to the northern Serengeti as the plains dry out, and spending the summer and early fall here before heading south again in the fall to repeat the cycle.

The scale of this event, and the encounters between predator and prey, offer an extraordinary and unequalled wildlife spectacle. Witnessing it firsthand is an awe-inspiring privilege.



When is the Best Time to See it?

The short answer is that you can't go wrong, because the migration never truly stops. Whenever you choose to go, the wildlife experiences are always extraordinary. We move our Serengeti camps seasonally to follow the herds, giving you access to world-class game viewing on every departure. Wilderness Travel offers Serengeti safaris in two seasons: from December through March, when the migration is in the south and the wildebeest give birth and nurture their calves, and from June through October, when the herds mass at the northern end of the park, preparing to cross the Mara River into Kenya.

SOUTHERN SERENGETI: DECEMBER THROUGH MARCH

More than two million years ago, volcanic eruptions spewed ash and debris onto the southern Serengeti plains, enriching the surrounding soil. As a result, lush grasses grow here in the green season—making it the perfect feeding ground for pregnant wildebeest to graze and produce nutrient-dense milk. Over a period of just a few weeks, females give birth to more than 300,000 calves; the presence of these wobbly-kneed newborns draws predators like big cats and hyena.

Our Dulana Camp, Serengeti South, sits near their migratory route, where columns of wildebeest can be seen stretching for miles, sometimes passing right by the camp itself! This is also an excellent time of year for bird-watching, as there is an abundance of migratory flocks passing over the plains.

CENTRAL & NORTHERN SERENGETI: JUNE THROUGH OCTOBER

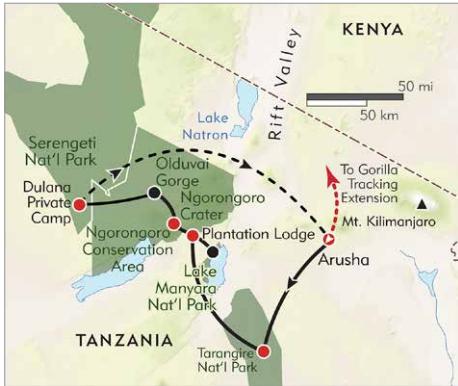

By this season, the herds will be in the northwest, having made their way from the western corridor of the park, and by June arriving at the Grumeti River, which now runs low and teems with opportunistic Nile crocodile. As the main body of the herd continues north over the summer months, wildebeest mass on the banks of the Mara River in incredible numbers before the hardest single part of their long journey: a dramatic, life-or-death river crossing into Kenya.

This is one of the greatest wildlife shows on Earth. In the northern Serengeti, we stay at Dulana Camp, Serengeti North, ideally positioned by the Mara River. We spend several days here, giving us a great chance of witnessing the dramatic river crossings made so famous in many wildlife documentaries. June is a transition month for the migration, so on that departure we spend two nights at Mbuzi Mawe Tented Camp in the central Serengeti before heading north to Dulana.

Tanzania: The Great Migration Itinerary



DAY 1 ARRIVE IN ARUSHA, TANZANIA

Late evening arrival at Kilimanjaro Airport near Arusha. Trip members arriving on Day 1 are met and transferred to our accommodation, the Olerai Guesthouse, set in a tranquil garden shaded by acacia trees. We have a light dinner and overnight at the lodge...D

DAY 2 TARANGIRE NATIONAL PARK / WILDERNESS TRAVEL'S PRIVATE OSUNYAI LAMARKAU CAMP

We depart for Tarangire, with a game drive and picnic lunch en route to our private camp in Osunyai, on the edge of the wilderness zone close to the Silalie wetland and prime habitat for elephant and buffalo. Set beneath glorious mature acacia trees facing the rising sun, our private camp at Osunyai has a classic bush camp backdrop in the heart of big game country. Overnight at private Wilderness Travel camp at Osunyai Lamarkau...BLD

DAYS 3-5 TARANGIRE NATIONAL PARK / WILDERNESS TRAVEL'S OSUNYAI LAMARKAU CAMP

Tarangire's grasslands and wooded bush country are home to enormous herds of elephant and migrating plains game. In addition to the large numbers of animals, the sheer variety of species seen in Tarangire continues to be one of its attractions. The short rains of November and December enrich Tarangire's grasslands, creating a canvas so green it almost defies description. At this time of year, bird species flood into Tarangire from southern Europe as they migrate for the winter, boosting an already full bird list. During the rainless summer months, the thousand-square-mile Tarangire region is a magnet for migrating herds, as the perennial Tarangire River becomes a lifeline for migratory herds of wildebeest and zebra, who travel to reach its fresh waters. It is astounding to see the tremendous seasonal concentrations: elephant clustered in the hundreds, huge herds of zebra, wildebeest, buffalo, eland,

and impala, smaller groups of oryx, kongoni, and Grant's gazelle and troops of baboon. Cheetah are rare here, but this is good habitat for leopard that can often be found resting in trees. Lion can be seen along the river or under trees, enjoying this dry-season time of bounty. Tarangire is also famous for its abundant birdlife. Special wildlife viewing activities include exploration in open vehicles with a 360-degree game viewing panorama (green season only—at other times of the year, we use our regular Toyota Land Cruisers). We also take exciting bush walks, exploring in the company of one of our full-time walking guides stationed at our Osunyai wilderness camp and qualified in all aspects of true game walking. Our specialist walking guide has extensive knowledge of wild animal behavior and the ability to track any animal of interest that we encounter during the walk. We will also have a special Maasai Olpul ceremony at the camp, with opportunities to learn more about the Maasai way of life, and can spend time beading with the young Maasai women at the camp. Under their skilled guidance, you can learn how to create your own piece of beaded jewelry. In addition to teaching us their craft, they'll share with us the significance of the beads in their culture. Overnights at private Wilderness Travel camp at Osunyai Lamarkau...BLD

and enjoy the surroundings of our accommodations. On one of these days, we spend the day on a game drive on the floor of Ngorongoro Crater, the largest unbroken caldera in the world and surrounded by steep walls rising some 2,000 feet from the floor. Ngorongoro's beauty and vastness must be seen to be believed: on the crater's 105-square-mile grassy floor lives Africa's largest permanent concentration of wildlife, a sort of mini-Serengeti in a phenomenally scenic setting. During our explorations, we're likely to see elephant, zebra, wildebeest, and buffalo, and there's hardly a better place on earth for observing lion than on the crater floor, where the lion prides are large. This is also one of the best places to see the endangered black rhino—about a dozen have been introduced into the crater environment and they are carefully monitored by biologists.

While in the area, we will also have the experience of a cultural





visit with the Datoga and Hadza. The Datoga consider themselves to be the oldest tribe in Tanzania, with origins dating back 3,000 years. They gradually migrated south from southern Sudan and Ethiopia and settled in the highlands of Kenya and Tanzania in about AD 1500. Originally fierce warriors, they are now mostly pastoralists and farmers, as well as skilled blacksmiths. Their clothing is generally of a reddish-brown color (the color of soil), with women wearing patched leather dresses, and they are distinguished for their distinctive tattooing around the eyes. The Hadza (who call themselves the Hadzabe) are one of the last hunter-gatherer tribes left in the world and distinct from other tribes in East Africa, both linguistically and genetically. Their diet consists of wild honey, tubers, berries, baobab, and large and small game. Overnights at Plantation Lodge...BLD each day

Note: Our specific activities on Days 6-8 vary with each departure, but you will experience it all, just in a different sequence.

December-March Itineraries:

July-October Itineraries:

Note: From Day 9, itineraries will differ between the two seasons depending on where the migration is in the Serengeti.



SOUTHERN SERENGETI: DECEMBER THROUGH MARCH ITINERARY

From December through March, following the “short rains” of November and early December, the migrating herds arrive in the short-grass plains of the southern Serengeti to enjoy the fresh grasses of the “green season.” This is calving time for the great herds, and our private camp is situated for the best access to the wildlife. See pages 11-12 for details on Days 9-13 of our June–October Northern Serengeti departures.

DAY 9 OLDUVAI GORGE / SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK / WILDERNESS TRAVEL'S PRIVATE DULANA CAMP

After breakfast at the lodge, we head to the southern Serengeti and Ndutu Plains. Along the way, we visit Olduvai, the small but fascinating archaeological site where Mary Leakey discovered

the Zinjanthropus skull. We enjoy a game drive en route to Dulana, our private camp on the edge of “Hidden Valley,” a little-known depression on the southern short grass plains of the Serengeti. Since the camp is set on the edge of the off-

road driving area, we are granted immediate access onto the short grass plains where cheetah are abundant and lion prides have their territory close to camp and the surrounding woodland. Our camp takes advantage of uninterrupted views across the shallow valley, where many species of animals can be spotted—and all from the comfort of our tents. Dulana's main lounge and dining tents also enjoy splendid views and are a

haven of comfort for the hours of daytime rest. Exclusive and remote, our private camp features roomy walk-in tents with

DAYS 10-12 SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK / WILDERNESS TRAVEL'S PRIVATE DULANA CAMP

During these three unforgettable days, we enjoy the privilege of exploring the Serengeti by 4WD vehicle from our own private camp. We have access to a rich mosaic of habitats crisscrossed by the rivers that run through this vast park. Dawn and late-afternoon game drives bring us into varied regions of the park, from the open plains and rock kopjes to river habitats, as game conditions dictate.

The Maasai, who have grazed their cattle on the vast grassy plains of Serengeti for millennia before it became a park, call it Siringitu, "the place where the land moves on forever." Today, Serengeti National Park, along with the Ngorongoro Conservation Area and Masai Mara National Reserve across the border in Kenya, protects the greatest and most varied collection of terrestrial wildlife on earth as well as one of the world's last great migratory systems. The park itself is 5,700

square miles, with open, grassy plains in the south, acacia-dotted savanna in the center, and black clay plains to the west.

We should see vast numbers of migrating wildebeest and zebra, along with Serengeti's resident wildlife, including giraffe, buffalo, topi, hartebeest, waterbuck, impala, reedbuck, bushbuck, dikdik, hippopotamus, crocodile, warthog, and diverse birdlife. Large prides of lion reside here, as well as clans of spotted hyena. The river tracks offer the best chance to see a leopard, usually in the branches of acacia or sausage trees. Cheetah can also be seen here as well as serval and caracal, two smaller African cats. Overnights at private Wilderness Travel camp at Dulana...BLD each day

A note about the spelling of Masai and Maasai: When referring to the Masai Mara, one "a" is used, but "Maasai" is used to refer to the people.

DAY 13 DEPART ARUSHA

A charter flight brings us to Arusha, where lunch is arranged for us and day rooms are held at the Olerai. Depart Tanzania in the evening, or join one of our many optional trip extensions...BL



CENTRAL & NORTHERN SERENGETI: JUNE THROUGH OCTOBER ITINERARY

Following the “long rains” of April and May, the migrating herds will have made their way through the Serengeti’s Western Corridor and up to the majestic Lamai Wedge, one of the most beautiful and iconic areas of the northern Serengeti, set between Kenya’s Masai Mara Reserve and the Mara River. They will spend the months of June through October enjoying the cooler weather of the northern Serengeti and crossing back and forth over the Mara River, depending on where the best grazing is. June is a transition month, and on that departure we will spend a few days at a camp in the central Serengeti as the herds make their way north.

DAY 9 OLDUVAI GORGE (JUNE) / SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK / LAMAI WEDGE / WILDERNESS TRAVEL’S DULANA PRIVATE CAMP

On the June departure as we depart Ngorongoro Crater, we visit Olduvai, the small but fascinating archaeological site where Mary Leakey discovered the *Zinjanthropus* skull (see note below). On July through October departures, a charter flight whisks us from the Manyara airstrip to one in the Serengeti. With fantastic game viewing and a picnic lunch en route, we drive into the northern Serengeti and the vast Lamai Wedge, south of the Mara River. Here, the migrating herds and their predators move through open plains dotted with desert date trees, and our camp lies directly in their path as they head toward the Mara River. Exclusive and remote, our private camp embodies the true spirit of romance under canvas, and each tent faces





the setting sun. Camp features walk-in tents with attached bathrooms and hot showers, and comfortable beds made up with linen and a duvet. You can also expect delicious, freshly cooked meals. Overnight at private Wilderness Travel camp at Dulana...BLD

Note: On the June departure, we visit Olduvai, then continue into Serengeti National Park on a game drive that brings us to Mbuji Mawe Tented Camp, a camp in the central Serengeti with comfortable en suite tented rooms. We spend an additional day here, allowing extra time to view the wildlife while they're still migrating through the central Serengeti before we head north to Dulana Camp on Day 11.

DAYS 10-12 SERENGETI NATIONAL PARK / LAMAI WEDGE / DULANA PRIVATE CAMP

We explore this remote area of the Serengeti ecosystem, following the movement of game. During this time of year, the Lamai Wedge and Northern Plains Corridor can be a focal

point for huge herds of thirsty wildebeest seeking water in the Mara River (and exciting wildebeest crossings can often be seen here). The diminished grasslands at this time of year force the herds to the very edge of the Serengeti/Mara border, and our camp lies directly in the route of the migrating wildebeest and zebra as they head toward the Mara River. Game viewing

has a completely different feel from the southern areas, with a twist of similarities that complements both locations. The river creates an exciting backdrop and an alternative wildlife haven to the surrounding short grass plains and kopje systems that dot the valleys of this

northern region. Overnight at private Wilderness Travel camp at Dulana...BLD each day

DAY 13 DEPART ARUSHA

A charter flight brings us to Arusha, where lunch is arranged for us and day rooms are held at the Olerai. Depart Tanzania in the evening, or join one of our many optional trip extensions...BL

Wilderness Travel's seasonal tented camps are strategically positioned well away from the lodge circuit in locations that put you in the heart of the wildlife action. In addition to offering delightful privacy and a sense of wilderness serenity, the camps pamper you with superb service and delightful amenities. And with a staff to guest ratio of 1:1, you will find them a relaxing oasis after a day on safari. Because the camps are exclusive to our group, you are guaranteed an intimate safari experience where each day's itinerary can adapt as each wildlife viewing experience presents itself.

ELEGANT DINING

Mealtime at our private camps is an unexpected highlight for many guests, with a mouth-watering array of fresh foods and baked goods prepared on site by our great cooks who are easily able to accommodate most diets. Menus

feature expertly prepared dishes like lamb curry, lentil salad with tomatoes and mint, grilled vegetables, and chicken



saltimbocca. Enjoy gourmet picnics beneath the shade of an acacia tree near grazing giraffe, and multi-course meals by candlelight served in our camp's deluxe dining tent. Wherever the meal, you'll feel as if you are in a fine restaurant, while the sights and sounds of the bush remind you that you are on safari!

LIVING UNDER CANVAS

The delightful location of each camp will put you in a romantic world apart. We'll return each day from safari to enjoy stories and laughter around the campfire with a complimentary open bar, before gathering for dinner served in a big, airy open-sided dining tent. Each night you drift to sleep to the enchanting sounds of the African night, enjoying the comforts of your own spacious tent featuring oriental carpets and a real bed (no cots!), along with an en suite bathroom and shower. We achieve all of this with a light environmental footprint—we use rechargeable resources and propane refrigeration instead of noisy generators, and offset all of our fuel usage through a carbon offsetting program.

SPACIOUS TENTS

Your walk-in canvas tent (approximately 30 x 14.5 feet in the Serengeti, tents are larger in Tarangire) is furnished with a king-sized bed (or two singles) cotton duvets, sheets, pillows, and battery-powered lighting. A small veranda at the front has camp chairs, a great place to relax and read.

PRIVATE BATHROOMS

At the rear of the tent is your attached bathroom, with a dressing room, warm-water shower, sink, and toilet.

PERSONAL SERVICE

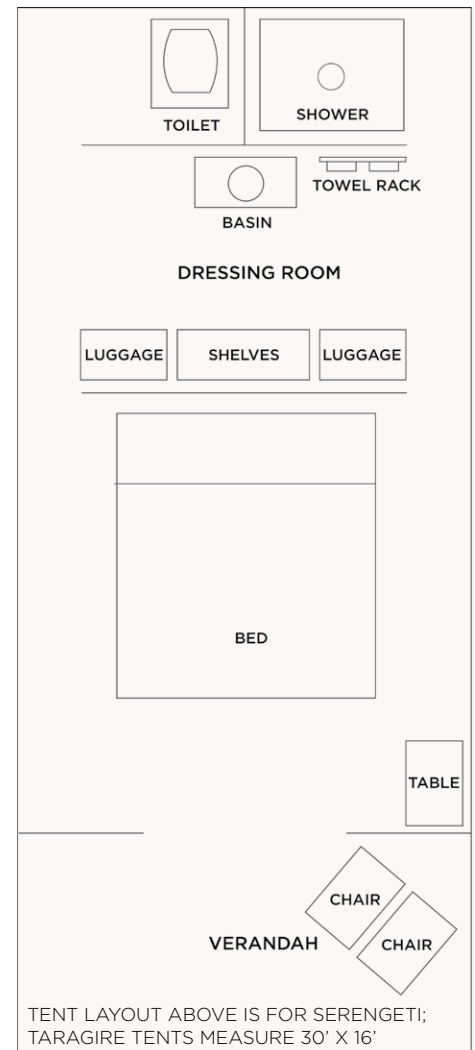
You'll have your own tent steward, along with complimentary daily laundry service.

OLERAI

Arusha, Tanzania

Day 1 (1 night), Day 13 (Day Room)

Once a private home, the Olerai is set on eight acres on the outskirts of Arusha. It welcomes guests with nine en suite rooms spread over the garden grounds. The family-style dining veranda overlooks the manicured lawns, and in the evenings, the fire is lit for socializing over a gin and tonic or regional wine. Mercy, the chef, and her crew prepare delightful cuisine for a farm-to-plate experience with home-grown vegetables and herbs. Olerai provides free Wi-Fi, concierge service, and massage services on request.

PLANTATION LODGE

Ngorongoro Conservation Area, Tanzania

Days 6 to 8 (3 nights)

With 16 lovely cottages spread out across flowering gardens and located near the Ngorongoro Crater, this elegant lodge has a peaceful setting and is in fact a working coffee plantation. The lodge offers very comfortable and nicely decorated rooms with en suite bathroom, a small sitting area, and a spacious veranda overlooking the gardens, which provide many of the vegetables and fruits served in the restaurant. There is a welcoming bar with a good wine list and the staff offers complimentary appetizers on the terrace before dinner. Or, enjoy a sundowner by the pool!





Our Safari Vehicles

Wilderness Travel's primary vehicles for this safari are Toyota Land Cruisers, renowned for being the most rugged and reliable 4X4 safari vehicles in the world. They excel in off-track terrain and each has been custom-modified with Volvo seats that offer adjustable lumbar support. With a maximum of just five guests per vehicle, each passenger is guaranteed his or her own window seat and ample room to stretch out—both for your legs and your camera gear! And best of all, the drivers are under no mileage restrictions—they will go where the wildlife viewing is best, and are under no pressure to limit their route to save gas, as is common in both lodge-based safaris and cheaper safaris, which use the cramped “pop-top” mini-vans that can't go off-road.

OUR VEHICLES HAVE BEEN EQUIPPED WITH:

- Roofs that pop up, providing you with unobstructed views and an ideal vantage for getting great photos, as well as welcome shade.
- Air conditioning as needed during warmer seasons when the hatches are closed (usually when traveling at higher speeds or when dusty or raining).
- Bean bags to help steady your longer lenses and get perfect wildlife shots.
- Multiple US-style outlets for recharging your batteries and other devices.
- An Engle Fridge with cold drinks and snacks.
- Refillable water bottles and thermos bottles of tea/coffee
- VHF Radio for communication between vehicles and HF Radio for long distance communication back to the Arusha office.
- On-board library, including field guides and maps of Tanzania and the national parks.
- First-aid kit.
- Fire extinguisher and comprehensive spares and tools.

“OPEN” SAFARI VEHICLES

At our Osunyai Lamarkau Camp in Tarangire, we will enjoy our daily game drives in “open” safari vehicles. These are rugged Land Cruisers, but we've stripped the walls and roof off the chassis to allow you to feel that there is nothing between you and the sights, sounds, and smells of Tanzania. It's a delightful experience and it offers excellent game viewing as the seating is gradually tiered, with the back rows higher than the front—similar to theater seating. There is an awning overhead to offer sun protection. Obviously, an open vehicle like this is only appropriate when the weather is good and there is no need to travel at fast speeds.



Trip Leaders

The skilled guides at Wilderness Travel transform your safari from amazing to absolutely life-changing. He knew from an early age that he wanted to become a safari guide, and after attending Mount Meru Tour Guiding College, he entered the profession, rising through the positions of camp crew, support vehicle driver, assistant guide, and now safari guide. His interests include mammal behavior, a particular favorite, and ornithology, a close second. Urassa gives back to his community by doing environmental work in his home area, for example, planting indigenous trees with school children on the slopes of Mount Meru, and educating them about environmental issues. Urassa has a keen spotter's eye, a love of the bush, and a wit and gentle manner that make him a great safari companion. He lives near his home village with his wife Stella and his three children.

MASAI MARA NATIONAL RESERVE EXTENSION

Set at an altitude of about 5,000 feet, the Masai Mara National Reserve is breathtakingly beautiful with the wide Mara River, one of Kenya's largest rivers, snaking through its green, tree-studded grasslands. The river is home to many hippos and enormous groups of elephant that wander through the lush marshes along the river's edge. Among the plains game found in the Mara are eland, topi, zebra, giraffe, and Thompson's and Grant's gazelle, and buffalo graze here in abundance. There are also some of the rare and endangered black rhino, not always easy to find but a wonderful sight when encountered. The Mara is one of the best places in Kenya to see lion, as there are numerous roaming prides. Early booking is recommended due to limited availability.

What to Expect

WHAT THE TRIP IS LIKE

This trip is rated Level 2+, Easy to Moderate, according to our trip grading system. This is a camping and lodge safari with game viewing by 4WD vehicle and nature walks that can be enjoyed by anyone in reasonably good health. There are a few long driving days over rough roads and rugged dirt tracks. At our private camps, we have opportunities for optional bush walks with a professional tracker as well as the flexibility to go out on game drives. The game-tracking walks are not difficult and are conducted at a pace that allows an intimate exploration of the African bush. Although this is not a particularly rigorous trip, we recommend that each participant undertake a preparatory program of physical conditioning. Daily walking or regular hiking, jogging, and stair-climbing are excellent ways to prepare for the trip. Any African safari is an adventure, and the traveler to Africa should bring along flexibility, a sense of humor, curiosity about new peoples and places, and an openness to the unexpected.

GAME DRIVES & WILD ANIMALS

Game drives are in 4WD Land Cruisers with guaranteed window seating (maximum of 5 passengers per vehicle)—there's no taking turns for the window seats. At Dulana and Osunyai, we also enjoy the freedom of exploration in open 4WD vehicles. A cooler of drinks and refreshments is carried aboard, along with a library of field guides and maps. We also do extensive gameviewing while traveling between game parks. Often, our Land Cruisers will split up in the parks to track game separately (each vehicle has a sophisticated radio system). Our 4WD vehicles can go virtually anywhere, an important feature when we're tracking game, and they add a sense of adventure to your African safari.

During drives, we can at times get quite close to wild animals. Being very quiet improves everybody's chances of observation. In the interest of safety, your Trip Leader explains limitations on movement while on game drives, in the safari vehicles, and around camp. Incidents with wild animals are extremely rare on safaris, but no camping safari can guarantee immunity from such incidents. Wilderness Travel is not to be held responsible for incidents involving the behavior of wildlife.

WEATHER

December to March is East Africa's "summer" with daytime temperatures from 80°-90° and evenings from 50° to 60°. June, July, and August are the coolest months, with lows around 40° and highs of 70°-80°. September, October, and November are warmer, with lows around 65° and highs of 75°-85°. Scattered rains occur in November and early December, which help to lay the dust.

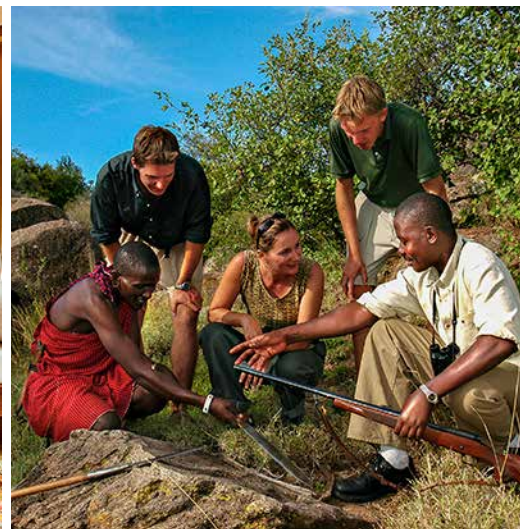

SUGGESTED INTERNATIONAL AIR SCHEDULE

Delta/KLM Airlines has the most convenient schedule to Arusha, Tanzania, with a stop in Amsterdam. Due to flight schedules, departure from the US is one or two days prior to Day 1.

Pre-Trip Day: Depart US from your hometown.

Day 1: Arrive in Amsterdam early in the morning, and depart on KLM at approximately 11:00 am. Arrive in Arusha at 8:00 pm.

Day 13: Depart Arusha on KLM at approximately 9:05 pm.

Day 14: Arrive Amsterdam at approximately 7:35 am and connect to onward flights.

Note: If you are traveling between December-March, consider leaving a day earlier if your hometown city airport (or connecting city airport) may be subject to airport closures or flight delays due to inclement weather.
