On this unique new safari, you'll discover Namibia and Botswana as few travelers do, with "insider" experiences that get you to pristine wildlife areas and into fascinating local cultures. We begin our breathtaking safari adventure at Victoria Falls, "the smoke that thunders." In the onceforbidden Caprivi Strip (now referred to as the Zambezi Strip) in northern Namibia, you'll explore the riverine landscapes of Bwabwata National Park, the new jewel in Namibia's conservation crown. Along the Kwando River, the elephant viewing is excellent, as is the birding along the reedy channels at the park's eastern fringe. We give you a complete change of scene in Botswana's waterworld of the Okavango Delta. Here, we'll safari by mokoro (dugout canoe) in the pristine lagoons of Nxamaseri in the northern Okavango Delta far from the Chobe crowds. Heading to a tented camp in the land of the traditional Ju/'hoan people, learn firsthand about their profound knowledge of the bush environment and join them on a walk to experience their traditional skills. Finally, we'll explore famed Etosha National Park as few do, from the eastern gate, as well as the exclusive private Onguma Game Reserve, home to a family of black rhinos as well as lion, leopard, and cheetah. We end our safari in Okonjima, home to the renowned AfriCat Foundation. We cap our group size at just six travelers, so we'll have many lodges for our exclusive use and great wildlife experiences shared with our phenomenal Trip Leader (wildlife experiences are so much richer with a small group!). If you're looking for an African wildlife adventure without equal, this is it!

Itinerary

DAY 1 VICTORIA FALLS, ZIMBABWE

On arrival at Victoria Falls Town in Zimbabwe, you are transferred to the welcoming family-operated Ilala Lodge. This relaxing hotel has an ideal location just minutes from spectacular Victoria Falls. Guest rooms have nice beds and all rooms have access to the central garden area. There is a pool if you wish to take a refreshing dip, or you can unwind on your patio. Keep an eye out for local wildlife—warthogs and impala are known to graze on the hotel's lawn. We gather for our trip orientation and Welcome Dinner this evening...D

DAYS 2-4 VICTORIA FALLS / NAMBWA TENTED LODGE / BWABWATA NATIONAL PARK

This morning, we hike right across from the face of the magnificent Victoria Falls—twice as wide and deep as Niagara. Crossing into Namibia, we enter the Zambezi Region (once known as the Caprivi Strip), a narrow finger of land that stretches across northern Namibia to the Zambezi River. This region was long off-limits to safari travelers but is renowned for its abundant wildlife, navigable waterways, and large stretches of national park—and lodges are few and far between, giving it a wonderfully remote feeling.

Our days are filled with game drives and boating on the Kwando River as we explore Bwabwata National Park, whose deciduous woodlands are dominated by wild seringa, false mopane, and Zambezi teak trees. Declared a national park in 2007, Bwabwata is known as a "people's park" because it supports both humans and wildlife. The park is a sanctuary for more than 35 large and small game species and upwards of 330 bird species. Game guards and resource monitors are hired from the local community, giving local people direct benefits from protecting wildlife. Animals that roam Bwabwata include elephant, hippo, roan, kudu, sable, buffalo, lion, leopard, hyena, cheetah, giraffe, impala, zebra, and wildebeest. One particularly excellent game viewing area is known as "the horseshoe," which, as the name suggests, is a large, perennial oxbow lake with white-sand beaches surrounded by Zambezi teak woodlands. Overnights at Nambwa Tented Lodge...BLD each day

Driving Details: 4.5-5 hours

BwaBwata: The riverine landscapes of Bwabwata are part of the new Kavango-Zambezi Transfrontier Conservation Area (Kaza), launched in March 2012 and connecting 110,833 square miles of protected regions in Botswana, Angola, Zambia, Zimbabwe and Namibia. The wildlife here migrates freely across fenceless borders and safari tourism helps local people benefit economically, providing a tangible incentive to protect their wildlife. A historic note: The Caprivi Strip is the legacy of the colonial scramble for Africa, when Britain swapped a piece of Bechuanaland (now Botswana) for Germany's Zanzibar during the Berlin Conference of 1890. Named after General Count George von Caprivi, the German Chancellor, the strip was renamed Zambezi in 2013. It was intended to create a navigable route from Namibia to Germany's

Tanganyika colony (now Tanzania) by way of the Zambezi River. However, the German planners forgot one about small topographic detail—the 350-foot drop of Victoria Falls—so the route never came to be.

DAY 5 TSODILO HILLS / MOKORO SAFARI / NXAMASERI ISLAND LODGE

In the morning, we visit the Tsodilo Hills, a World Heritage Site and the highest point in Botswana at 4,593 feet. San people painted thousands of striking images on the rock faces of these quartzite hills between 800 and 1,300 AD, creating one of the world's most significant rock art collections. We'll walk trails to view paintings then head back to our lodge for lunch. In the afternoon, we take to mokoros (dugout canoes)-mokoros are the traditional transport of the Okavango Delta, typically used by the local people for fishing, collecting food, and transport. The canoes were originally carved out of tree trunks but these days are made of fiberglass to protect the tree species that were used previously. We set out for a truly enriching perspective of the Okavango Delta by mokoro, with a guide using a pole to push the mokoro through the channels. It's a wonderfully quiet way to explore, with just the sound of the birds and the water to accompany us. The Okavango flows inland into the Kalahari Desert, creating a labyrinth of lagoons, lakes, and hidden channels. The Delta's waters are continuously moving, from winding rivers to almost hidden channels that seep into walls of papyrus and phragmites reeds. Palms and towering trees abound,

throwing shade over crystal pools and grassy glades. Overnight at Nxamaseri Island Lodge, set among the meandering river channels of the Okavango Delta—and far from the safari crowds of Chobe...BLD Driving Details: 4-4.5 hours

DAY 6 NXAMASERI ISLAND LODGE / OKAVANGO DELTA, BOTSWANA

Today, we'll explore the unique surroundings of the lodge, set on a heavily wooded island and surrounded by tranquil waterways and expansive floodplains, and enjoy boating on the lagoons. The Nxamaseri area has strong traditional links to the San people of Botswana—"Nxamaseri" is the San word used to describe "the sound the wind makes when it blows through the reeds." Overnight at Nxamaseri Island Lodge…BLD

DAYS 7-8 NHOMA SAFARI CAMP / SAN TRIBES / //NHOQ'MA VILLAGE

We enter a different world today, that of one of Africa's oldest cultural groups, the San tribe. Our accommodation, Nhoma Safari Camp, lies within the ancient traditional area of Namibia's Ju/'hoansi San people. The camp was created at the request of the community in 1999 by Arno Oosthuysen, a Namibian born in Windhoek who had traveled as a boy with his medical-doctor father, visiting clinics in remote areas in Namibia. He was asked by the // Nhoq'ma (in the "click" languages of the San people, two







forward slashes give pronunciation guidance) to bring travelers to their remote village for much needed income. This rustic camp was built with the help of the local people and gives them direct employment and income, which has made it possible for them to live on their ancestral lands rather than moving to cities. We will have the privilege of learning firsthand about, and supporting, their rich cultural traditions, although they are by no means currently living a pure hunter-gatherer existence. Our activities center around the life of the community: hunting and food gathering, traditional games, healing dances, and the making of hunting equipment. There is no set schedule for our time here, but skills such as fire-making and rope-making and setting of traps will be demonstrated. One activity will be our bush walk with a group of three or four Ju/'hoansi hunters, whom we follow as they collect from the bush and demonstrate how they hunt. If fresh tracks are found, our walk will turn into a hunt (hunts are rarely successful, but always fascinating!). For the //Nhoq'ma, the finding of a bee's nest is just as important as hunting an animal. Our Ju/'hoansi hunters will also point out medicinal plants they use along the way. Typically, the walk does not follow a fixed route and the duration can be adapted to our interests.

In the afternoon, we join the community as they participate in traditional games and jewelry making. Most evenings, a powerful giraffe or elephant healing dance is performed. The ceremony is the way the //Nhoq'ma shamans cure illness and relieve social tensions. In our time here, we will gain an insight into their profound knowledge of their

natural surroundings and into a way of life that, against all odds, has survived for thousands of years. Although these communities no longer live solely as nomadic huntergatherers, they are eager to share their traditions with us. The presence of interested travelers makes it possible for them to keep the connections to their ancestral lands. Overnights at Nhoma Safari Camp...BLD each day

Driving Details: 8 hours on Day 7

Note: Nhoma Safari Camp is a basic camp but grants us wonderful access to experience the culture of these nearby communities.

DAY 9 ONGUMA GAME RESERVE / ONGUMA TENTED CAMP

We make our way to our lodge on the eastern gate of Etosha National Park, where wildlife and landscapes differ from those on the more accessible and visited southern side of the park. The eastern side of Etosha offers more diverse game viewing than the southern side of the park because seasonal precipitation here provides a more productive ecosystem for wildlife. Onguma Tented Camp, with its elegant main building and seven beautifully furnished tents, is a delightful safari accommodation. In the local Herero language, Onguma means "the place you don't want to leave." After settling in, we head out for a sundowner game drive into the private Onguma Game Reserve, which borders this famed park. With its mix of pans, woodlands, and open plains, Onguma is home to kudu, giraffe, zebra,

impala, and other plains game as well as lion, leopard, and cheetah—it's also the proud home to a family of rare black rhinos! After dinner at camp, we can gather a few steps away at the campfire area to share stories of the day and watch the wildlife activity at the waterhole. Overnight at Onguma Tented Camp...BLD

Driving Details: 4-4.5 hours

DAY 10 ETOSHA NATIONAL PARK / ONGUMA TENTED CAMP

A morning of game viewing by 4WD vehicle brings us into the vast eastern reaches of Etosha National Park. Proclaimed a wildlife reserve back in 1907, Etosha is a haven for wildlife, including four of the Big Five—rhino, leopard, lion, and elephant. Other large mammals include giraffe, wildebeest, hyena, mountain and plains zebra, springbok, kudu, eland, and the endemic black-faced impala. And with more than 340 species, the birding in Etosha is fantastic. We'll have a picnic during our game drive in the park, then return to camp for a siesta before heading out for a sundowner game drive in Onguma Game Reserve. Overnight at Onguma Tented Camp...BLD

DAY 11 AFRICAT FOUNDATION / LEOPARD TRACKING / OKONJIMA LUXURY BUSH CAMP

Journeying from Onguma, we arrive at lovely Okonjima Bush Camp in time for lunch. Okonjima is home to the renowned AfriCat Foundation, dedicated to the longterm conservation of Namibia's large carnivores through research, education, and community engagement. AfriCat researchers and veterinarians contribute greatly to our understanding of the ecology of large carnivores in enclosed and protected reserves. Since its founding in 1991, over a thousand injured or captured predators have been rescued at AfriCat, with over 85% being released back into the wild. This afternoon, we head out by 4WD vehicle for the thrilling experience of tracking leopard, which we may find resting in the trees after their night of hunting. There's also a chance of spotting brown hyena. You'll learn about the vital work AfriCat is doing to ensure the survival of big cats in Namibia. In the evening, we may have the option to visit the night hide and see nocturnal wildlife. Overnight at Okonjima Bush Camp...BLD

Driving Details: 4-4.5 hours

DAYS 12-13 AFRICAT FOUNDATION / WINDHOEK / DEPART

Enjoy a morning game drive followed by a brunch at Africat, then we'll make our to Galton House, a small boutique hotel set in a quiet neighborhood in Windhoek. We'll enjoy a celebratory Farewell Dinner tonight and toast our three-country safari. Depart on Day 13 via Windhoek International Airport, or join one of our extensions: Cape Town (South Africa) or Among the Elephants Extension (Zimbabwe)...BLD on Day 12, B on Day 13.

CAPE TOWN EXTENSION

The town where modern South Africa was born has a glorious location on the mountainous Cape Peninsula along the blue waters of Table Bay. There is much to see, from Table Mountain to the famous botanical gardens at Kirstenbosch, where 10,000 species are cultivated on 1,000 acres. Close by is Stellenbosch and Franschhoek wine country and the Cape Point Nature Reserve, where the African continent ends.

Along the northern Atlantic Coast of Namibia, hot desert sand dunes meet the cold Benguela Current creating thick banks of fog that have caused countless shipwrecks over the years. The hulls of wrecked vessels give this coast its unforgettable name—the Skeleton Coast. Explore this haunting realm from an extraordinary lodge, the Shipwreck Lodge, designed to immerse you in this utterly remote location. Witness Cape fur seals that line the rocky shorelines, walk along beaches and dunes strewn with whale bones and the remnants of shipwrecks, and venture into the richly colored desert terrain by 4WD—a thrilling adventure in one of the most secluded and surreal landscapes on the planet!

Accommodations



ILALA LODGE
Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe
Day 1 (1 night)

The family-operated Ilala Lodge is a relaxing hotel with an ideal location just minutes from spectacular Victoria Falls. Perfectly manicured gardens and thatched roofs set the scene as you are welcomed into the open-air lobby. Guest rooms have nice beds and all rooms have access to the central garden area. There is a pool if you wish to take a refreshing dip, or you can unwind on your patio. The award-winning Palm Restaurant is also located at the hotel, which offers views of the falls. Keep an eye out for local wildlife—warthogs and impala are known to graze on the hotel's lawn.



NAMBWA TENTED LODGE

Bwabwata National Park, Namibia Days 2 to 4 (3 nights)

Set on the banks of the perennial Kwando River, Nambwa Tented Lodge is in the heart of the Mashi Conservancy inside Bwabwata National Park. The lodge gives access to vast areas of pristine and unspoiled wildlife habitat and its well-appointed tented suites are built high up in trees along the Kwando River and its floodplains, offering stunning views. Each suite is spacious, with an en-suite bathroom and large shower. There is mosquito netting around the bed to ensure an undisturbed sleep, and a private deck where you can relax. All the tented suites have access to the main lodge via elevated boardwalks.



NXAMASERI ISLAND LODGE

Okavango Delta, Botswana Days 5 to 6 (2 nights)

Set on a small secluded wooded island in the Okavango Panhandle, Nxamaseri Island Lodge is a prime destination for seeing hippo, crocodile, and the elusive sitatunga, a semi-aquatic antelope. The birdlife is first class (350 recorded species!) and includes Pel's fishing owl. From the lounge and dining area, wooden decks lead to spacious brick and thatch chalets featuring twin or double beds with crisp white linens and comfy duvets. Each has en suite facilities and a private deck overlooking the Nxamaseri Channel.



NHOMA SAFARI CAMP

Tsumkwe, Namibia Days 7 to 8 (2 nights)

This simple tented camp is situated within the communal land of the Ju/'hoan tribe, and our stay here contributes directly to the community. The camp is spread over a vegetated dune with views over the Nhoma omuramba (dry riverbed) and it's just a short walk to the Ju/'hoan village called //Nhoq'ma. The camp has basic walk-in tents with private verandas shaded by large Zambezi teak trees. The tents have beds and an en-suite bathroom with hot water. At the highest point of the camp is the thatched dining area, where our meals are served buffet style. The camp was built by Arno Oosthuysen with the help of the //Nhoq'ma community. Tourism allows the community to earn money for food and supplies not provided by the surrounding environment and make it possible for the community to stay on their ancestral land.



ONGUMA TENTED CAMP

Namibia Days 9 to 10 (2 nights)

With only seven tented camps sprawled around a watering hole, Onguma is a peaceful respite that still puts you in the heart of the action in Etosha. An elevated wooden pathway connects the main lobby and restaurant. Tents are wonderfully appointed, with large beds, rock and wooden accents, and spacious en-suite bathrooms. Enjoy a sundowner around the fire pit and search for wildlife while dining at the camp's restaurant serving delicious cuisine and a nice wine list.

OKONJIMA BUSH CAMP Omboroko Mountains, Namibia

Day 11 (1 night)

Home to the AfriCat Foundation, this luxury bush camp features eight thatched, African-style chalets decorated in earthy tones. The chalets are very spacious, have en suite bathrooms, and can be opened wide during the day for enjoying the views and watching birds in the garden right from your room. A secluded swimming pool awaits at the end of a busy day of game viewing. The food is of a very high standard and the staff and guides are terrific.



GALTON HOUSE

Windhoek, Namibia Day 12 (1 night)

This welcoming nine-room hotel, just a 10-minute shuttle drive from the center of town, offers a personal and informal atmosphere. Guest rooms are decorated in an inviting modern style, with wildlife photography adorning the walls. Communal areas include a large lounge, indoor and outdoor dining areas, and a small swimming pool. The hotel is named after the explorer and polymath Francis Galton, who produced the first maps of Namibia's interior.

With a maximum of seven passengers per vehicle, everyone is ensured a window seat and plenty of room to stretch out their gear and legs. Besides being the very best off-roading 4WD vehicles available, all of our vehicles feature:

- Pop-top roofs for better photography and game vantage points, located at both driver's front and back cabin
- Air conditioning
- Onboard fridge with plenty of water
- Library, including guide books, maps, stationary, and species check lists
- 220-volt electrical outlets to recharge batteries on the go
- VHF radios to allow group communication while on the road
- "Magic boxes" for en-route catering, from bush breakfasts, coffee and tea stops, to sundowners!





Trip Details

TRIP LEVEL

This trip is rated Level 2+, Easy to Moderate, according to our trip grading system. This is a lodge safari with game viewing by 4WD vehicle and short walks (during the San tribe portion of the trip) that can be enjoyed by anyone in reasonably good health.

How Tough is This Trip?

While we do not see major elevation gain or loss, you need to be able to walk on uneven surfaces and feel comfortable on your feet for up to two hours a day.

Please note that the average road journey between our six lodges takes about five hours, sometimes longer. The Trip Leader will discuss what to expect on the drive and how long the journey might be. Most of the roads are gravel and are in excellent condition but take longer to drive than a paved highway. All the routes are scenic. We will be traveling in comfortable safari vehicles, and driving times may vary depending on sights of interest we come upon, photographic opportunities, or wildlife encounters. Ideally, we will depart for drives after breakfast so as to arrive early enough at the next lodge in time for afternoon game viewing.

During drives and walks, we can at times get quite close to wild animals. Being very quiet improves everyone's chances of observation. In the interest of safety, your Trip Leader explains limitations on movement while on game drives, in the safari vehicles, and around camp. Incidents with wild animals are extremely rare on safaris, but no trip can guarantee immunity from such incidents. Wilderness Travel is not to be held responsible for incidents involving the behavior of wildlife.

WEATHER

Namibia has a typical desert climate: hot in the day, and cool at night, mostly sunny and dry. Daytime temperatures range from the mid-70°Fs to the low 90°Fs, with night temperatures dropping to the 40°Fs and 50°Fs. The coastal region is cool and dry throughout the year. In Botswana in June and July, there is minimal rainfall and the bush turns golden brown, so game viewing is easier and animals concentrate around major water sources. Daytime

temperatures range from the upper 70°Fs to mid 80°Fs, and nighttime temperatures can sometimes drop to below freezing, so warm layers are necessary. The temperatures at Victoria Falls this time of year are similar with highs in the upper 70°Fs to low 80°Fs, dropping to the mid-40°Fs and low 50°Fs at night.
