

About the same size as South Africa's vast Kruger National Park, Zimbabwe welcomes just a fraction of the visitors and offers an intimate safari rarely found in other parks. We're unlikely even to see other safari vehicles as we explore Hwange's famed Ngamo



Plains, and in Zambezi National Park, we explore by canoe from our riverside camp. We'll safari among Hwange National Park's great elephant herds and big numbers of lion, leopard, and cheetah, all the while enjoying exquisite boutique lodges with superb access to wildlife. Your participation helps support innovative local community conservation projects.

What Makes WT's Wild Zimbabwe Trip Special?



HWANGE: AFRICA'S HIDDEN GEM

Hwange National Park, Zimbabwe's biggest and most diverse national park, quietly rivals better-known Kruger and the Serengeti, yet without the crowds. Hwange boasts over 100 species of mammals and is known for its thriving elephant population (an estimated 50,000), the largest in Africa. There are also lions by the hundreds, including renowned prides who have a territory near our lodge at Nehimba, and there's a thriving cheetah population on the Ngamo Plains (our guides know the habits of several generations of these elegant hunters). The Ngamo Plains also shelter one of the continent's largest populations of African painted dog, an endangered species. Our lodges are set in distinctly different landscapes of Hwange, and are positioned to give you fantastic access to the wildlife.



EXCLUSIVE ACCESS

Unbelievably, we're unlikely to see other safari vehicles as we explore the famed Ngamo Plains at the eastern end of Hwange, even though it's one of the park's most productive wildlife areas, as most lodges are clustered in the north. Even in the north, Nehimba Lodge has the largest private concession in the entire park, with 100 square miles of exclusive wilderness, right on the elephant migration path. You'll see tuskers in great numbers gathered around the waterhole at our lodge. At Victoria Falls, we stay at Ilala Lodge, set in the heart of town just an eight-minute walk from the Falls. In Zambezi National Park, we enjoy the serene haven of Victoria Falls River Lodge.



THE MOST ACTIVE AND VARIED SAFARI

Our safari starts at Victoria Falls, where we admire the astonishing spectacle of the falls—double the height of Niagara—as they plunge into the Batoka Gorge. We enter Hwange National Park with a flight to an airstrip near our first lodge, then travel to our next lodge in style—aboard the *Elephant Express*, a vintage railway car. In Hwange, the big thrill is when we leave the safari vehicle to track game on foot with our expert Trip Leader—being on foot is the most exciting way to experience African wildlife. In addition to game drives in our open-sided vehicles, we'll observe wildlife from an ingenious underground blind that gives us waterhole-level views of hippos and elephants (it's a photographer's dream, and it even has a fridge for cool drinks and a bathroom). Night game drives reveal a whole new world in Hwange, and when we get to Zambezi National Park, we'll explore the Zambezi River shoreline and nearby islands by canoe before enjoying sundowners by boat.



SMALL GROUPS AND AFRICA'S BEST SAFARI GUIDES

Our groups are limited to just 12 travelers. This gives you a more personalized experience, close access to your superbly trained Trip Leader, and a "window seat" in our open-sided safari vehicles for great photography. The Trip Leader is with you for your whole adventure—you aren't handed off from guide to guide at each lodge. Zimbabwe's guide accreditation program is the most rigorous in Africa, and we work with the very best of these world-class safari guides. They're expert trackers who can bring you the unmatched thrill of tracking African wildlife on foot, one of the most sought-after experiences on a safari.



Highlights of Wild Zimbabwe



COMMUNITY & CONSERVATION IS WOVEN INTO YOUR SAFARI

Local villages once had nothing to gain from safari tourism, but we—together with our Zimbabwe partners—are changing that. Camelthorn Lodge is on land rented from the local community, providing them income and employment. With the new Community Rhino Conservation Initiative, villagers have entrusted some of their communal land as a rhino sanctuary and they benefit as rhino guardians, with 70% of revenue from rhino-viewing tourism going directly back to them. This initiative will also sustainably re-introduce the rhino to this part of Zimbabwe.





RIDE THE ELEPHANT EXPRESS

Enjoy travel—and game viewing!—by rail, an experience that harkens back to yesteryear as we travel in Hwange aboard an open-air vintage rail car for a ride that provides a fantastic opportunity for photography en route to the next leg of the adventure.

WATCH ELEPHANTS FROM THE DECK IN NEHIMBA


The elephant is the icon of Hwange, and our private concession at Nehimba Lodge is set right on the elephants' migration trail. They often congregate by the hundreds at Nehimba, and the large bulls of the herd enjoy our lodge's swimming pool as a gathering spot and a handy source of drinking water. You'll find yourself dining by candle light on the lodge's deck within just a few yards of these mighty creatures and be able to observe their social interactions—it's unforgettable.





SEE THE SMOKE THAT THUNDERS: VICTORIA FALLS

The Zambezi River spills into the chasm of Batoka Gorge at Victoria Falls, a thunderous World Heritage Site and the unforgettable introduction to our safari. We experience a Zimbabwean sunset on a sundowner cruise on the Zambezi, on the lookout for hippo and other creatures drawn to the waters, tour the best viewpoints of the Falls, and stay at Ilala Lodge, with its luxury and comfort in the heart of Victoria Falls.



DAY 1 VICTORIA FALLS / ILALA LODGE

Arrive at Zimbabwe's Victoria Falls Airport, where you'll be met by your private guide for your transfer to our accommodation, the family-operated Ilala Lodge. This relaxing hotel has an ideal location just minutes from spectacular Victoria Falls. The afternoon is free to settle into your room, have a swim, or unwind on your patio. Keep an eye out for local wildlife—warthogs and impala are known to graze on the hotel's lawn. Or, if you prefer, you will be invited to enjoy a sundowner cruise on the Zambezi River (canapes and drinks included!). (Please note: you must be in Victoria Falls in the early afternoon to join this optional sundowner cruise.) We'll float up the river, on the lookout for animals coming down to drink or the many hippo that often pop up to welcome us. After disembarking, the evening will be spent back at Ilala Lodge enjoying a Welcome Dinner. Overnight at Ilala Lodge...D

DAY 2 VICTORIA FALLS / HWANGE NATIONAL PARK / NEHIMBA LODGE

Known as Mosi-oa-Tunya, or "the smoke that thunders," the cascade of Victoria Falls extends more than a mile across the Zambezi River (that's more than twice the size of Niagara Falls!). This World Heritage Site and natural wonder offers us an unforgettable introduction to our safari. After breakfast, our guide whisks us to the mighty Falls to take in the spectacular vistas and walk through the rainforest, enjoying a guided tour and incredible scenes of the cascades of water—a once-in-a-lifetime experience! We'll then head to the airport to catch a fight to the Giraffe Springs airstrip and look for game as we drive to Nehimba Lodge in Hwange National Park. Spanning some 5,600 square miles, Hwange is both the first (founded in 1928) and largest park in the nation. It is home to some of the highest







concentrations of elephant on the planet (around 44,000) along with lion, leopard, and buffalo, and it's world famous as a birding destination. Nehimba is the perfect spot for exploring northern Hwange, with its mopane woodland and sand river

environment. Nehimba's raised, thatched chalets are around a lively watering hole frequented by elephants and other wildlife, including herds of buffalo and wild dog. Dinner is served outdoors with good views of the activity at the waterhole. After dinner, you can join an optional night game drive to spot the animals that are just starting their "day." Overnight at Nehimba Lodge...BLD

DAY 3 NEHIMBA SEEP / NEHIMBA LODGE

Today we head out for game drives and game walks to explore more of the northern reaches of Hwange, which is distinctly different from the southern area of the park in its topography, habitats, and species of wildlife. At the Nehimba Seep, an ancient source of water once used by San Bushmen, we'll stop for a tea break and wildlife viewing. Elephants still come here to dig for water and nourishing minerals in the soil. We'll

head back to the lodge for lunch and a siesta or a swim in the pool (with elephants often sipping from the waterhole just yards away). Our late afternoon game drive ends with cool refreshments at sunset overlooking a famed waterhole. Dinner

> is back at the lodge, with an evening to relax around the campfire and discuss the day's events. Overnight at Nehimba Lodge...BLD

DAY 4 NORTHWEST HWANGE / ELEPHANT EXPRESS / **CAMELTHORN LODGE**

Wake up to morning birdsong and set out for an early game walk, a great way to experience Hwange on foot and see the small details of the bush, such as bird's nests and game tracks. After a hearty

brunch back at the lodge, we head 2-3 hours to the railway depot at Dete to catch the Elephant Express, a vintage openair railway car that glides along the historic track built in 1904 by Cecil Rhodes. We'll savor lunch on board and enjoy exciting afternoon game viewing in comfort as we travel deeper into the park. At Ngamo, we disembark and board 4WD vehicles for a sundowner game drive to our stylish lodge, Camelthorn.

Set in a small patch of pristine woodlands on the edge of the Ngamo Plains, Camelthorn is also a community-based lodge, helping support local schools and water projects. We'll settle into our forest villas and enjoy a delicious dinner beneath the namesake camelthorn tree. Overnight at Camelthorn Lodge... BLD

DAY 5 HWANGE NATIONAL PARK / CAMELTHORN LODGE

After waking up to the sounds of the African bush and

enjoying an early breakfast, we set out for a morning of game viewing in our open-air vehicles. Elephant, giraffe, zebra, wildebeest, and impala are often seen in these parts, making for an exhilarating day in the bush. One of the things that makes Hwange unique in comparison to other great African parks is that it has no major rivers. The absence of year-round surface water in Hwange means the animals rely heavily on man-made waterholes to survive.

Over the years, a series of boreholes have been drilled to pump life-sustaining water for the park's wildlife. Our trips take place during the dry season, when wildlife frequents these waterholes, enhancing game viewing opportunities.

In the afternoon, we visit the Rhino Sanctuary. Our partners in Zimbabwe, Imvelo Safari Lodges, are proud and excited to be spearheading the return of white rhino in Hwange under the auspices of the Community Rhino Conservation Initiative (CRCI). The CRCI concept is to establish a highly protected rhino sanctuary on community land bordering the park. We'll tour the sanctuary headquarters, meet some of the Community Wildlife Protection Scouts on duty that day, and spend time with the rhino and the rangers who guard them 24/7 (great

photo opportunities!). Later, we head out for a 4WD game drive, followed by the safari tradition of "sundowner" drinks in a beautiful location at sunset. For our night game drive, our game spotters will bring out spotlights so we can look for nocturnal animals on the way back to the lodge. Dinner and overnight at Camelthorn Lodge...BLD

DAY 6 HWANGE NATIONAL PARK / MFAGAZAAN PAN

Another full day of game viewing

awaits! We'll have tables and chairs set up for a picnic lunch overlooking the Mfagazaan Pan and watch as the animals make their way across the dry plains for a drink of fresh water. A leisurely late afternoon drive from pan to pan brings us back



to the lodge, weaving our way between throngs of elephants. After dinner at the lodge, we enjoy a nightcap by the campfire, sharing stories and photos of the day's excursions. Overnight at Camelthorn Lodge...BLD

DAY 7 NGUNYANA VILLAGE AND SCHOOL VISIT / AFTERNOON GAME DRIVE / CAMELTHORN LODGE

A memorable cultural opportunity is in store this morning. We head to nearby Ngunyana village and join the local school children on their walk from the village to their school. On arrival at the school, we'll be welcomed with a wonderful singing performance by the kids. Following this, we interact

with them as they try to teach us a few words of Ndebele, their tribal "click" language! It's always fun and the teachers encourage the interaction as a way for the children to meet people from all over the world and learn about different cultures. After the school visit, we head over to a local homestead to see the typical daily activities at the village. Our late afternoon game drive brings us to a specially built

underground game-viewing blind at Stoffie's Pan, where we'll enjoy sundowners and snout-level viewing of thirsty elephants. The blind is furnished with comfortable seating and a bathroom. Tonight we head out on a night drive, looking for nocturnal species that prowl the plains after twilight. Dinner will be served en route, bush-style, beneath the spectacular star-lit sky. Overnight at Camelthorn Lodge...BLD

DAY 8 HWANGE AND ZAMBEZI NATIONAL PARK / BOAT SAFARI / VICTORIA FALLS RIVER LODGE

After a final walking safari in the Hwange wilderness, we fly to Victoria Falls and transfer to Zambezi National Park, whose northern border is formed by the Zambezi River.

Arriving in the afternoon, we'll settle in at Victoria Falls River Lodge, our picturesque lodge on the banks of the river, where

each thatched tent has river views and its own private plunge pool on its deck. Tonight's sundowners will be aboard a boat as we safari along the Zambezi at sunset, watching for elephant, hippo, crocodile, and a great variety of birdlife as gold and crimson colors reflect off the tranquil waters. Dinner and overnight at Victoria Falls River Lodge...BLD

DAY 9 ZAMBEZI CANOE SAFARI / VICTORIA FALLS RIVER LODGE

In 1857, Scottish explorer and medical missionary David Livingstone embarked on his historic expedition to chart the Zambezi waters. This morning we'll set off by canoe to chart our own waters, exploring the river as it flows along the lovely Siansimba Islands, where we keep an eye out for hippo, crocodile, elephant, buffalo, and the occasional lion and giraffe. We'll stop along the river's edge for a relaxing brunch, then later head back to the lodge by safari vehicle. The afternoon is free to enjoy your private plunge pool and a light lunch. Tonight is a game drive with sundowners on

Deeply committed to wildlife conservation and the surrounding communities, Butch has been at the forefront of the most innovative conservation programs in the country, involving villagers in the protection of wildlife, and ensuring that they benefit from safaris. Endlessly energetic, hugely entertaining, and limitless in his knowledge of Africa's wildlife, Butch is a force of nature and an absolute delight to travel with.



VUSA NCUBE

Vusa Ncube was born in 1989 in Ngamo village, just outside of Hwange National Park. As a boy looking after his family's cattle, he dealt firsthand with the delicate balance between humans and wildlife. The same animals that were once a dangerous threat to his livestock and family are now the source of his livelihood, and he is passionate about sharing his insights with visitors from around the world. Vusa attended Regina Mundi Secondary in Gwayi, and earned his degree in Travel and Tourism at Speciss College in Bulawayo. After years of hard work and dedication, Vusa successfully completed the guide training program through the National Parks and Wildlife Management Authority in Zimbabwe, and is a fully license Zimbabwe Professional Guide. Zimbabwe's Professional Guides are regarded as among the best in Africa, due to the stringent qualification process they are required to complete. Vusa feels a close connection with the surrounding wildlife as well as with his community, and loves to share his keen eye for spotting birds and animals with fellow travelers.



PETE NDLOVU

Pete Ndlovu is a Hwange specialist, born and raised near Hwange National Park in an area where subsistence farming often comes into conflict with wildlife. A fascination with nature around him became the driving force of his life, and he achieved his first professional Zimbabwe guide's license in 2016. Pete has a fantastic knowledge of the terrain, typography, and wildlife, and in addition to big game, he's passionate about birds and the medicinal uses of herbs in the Hwange region. ILALA LODGE
Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe

Day 1 (1 night)

The family-operated Ilala Lodge is a relaxing hotel with an ideal location just minutes from spectacular Victoria Falls. Perfectly manicured gardens and thatched roofs set the scene as you are welcomed into the open-air lobby. Guest rooms have nice beds and all rooms have access to the central garden area. There is a pool if you wish to take a refreshing dip, or you can unwind on your patio. The award-winning Palm Restaurant is also located at the hotel, which offers views of the falls. Keep an eye out for local wildlife—warthogs and impala are known to graze on the hotel's lawn.



NEHIMBA LODGE

Hwange, Zimbabwe Days 2 to 3 (2 nights)

Raised thatched tent chalets arcing around a watering hole make Nehimba Lodge a spectacular place to witness elephants and other animals drink and play in northern Hwange National Park. Whether you come during the green or dry season, Nehimba's location within the park offers fantastic opportunities to view a wide variety of birdlife like giant eagle owl, Burchell's sandgrouse, and red-billed francolin, and possibly see the famous elephant hunting lions that prowl this part of the park. Private, enclosed outdoor showers are attached to each chalet, and all have beautiful open-beam thatched ceilings and verandas overlooking the watering hole. For a refreshing dip, relax at the lodge's pool, and with luck, have an up-close encounter with elephants—they're known to come right up to the pool's edge!

CAMELTHORN LODGE

Hwange, Zimbabwe Days 4 to 7 (4 nights)

Tucked in the forested fringes of southern Hwange National Park, Camelthorn Lodge is the perfect place to experience life in the bush without sacrificing comfort. The main lodge has a community dining area and buffet station for breakfast, yet you can also enjoy your meals beneath the lodge's namesake camelthorn tree. Eight villas are designed to stay cool in the warmer months and cozy during the colder months with tall ceilings, large stone and tiled bathrooms, and each has a private viewing deck with a hammock so you can unwind beneath a canopy of acacia trees, watching an abundance of birdlife—and small woodland creatures—right from your room.



VICTORIA FALLS RIVER LODGE

Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe Days 8 to 9 (2 nights)

Set on the banks of the Zambezi River near magnificent Victoria Falls is the elegant Victoria Falls River Lodge. This property is actually the first private game lodge to be built within the Zambezi National Park, and its legacy still stands as one of the best locations for nearby activities and game viewing. Friendly staff welcome you in the open-air lobby and guide you to one of the lodge's meticulously designed thatched tents that are spread around the property. The thatched tents are constructed of canvas, glass, and timber, and each suite extends out onto its own private deck with a plunge pool and uninterrupted views of the Zambezi.

OKAVANGO DELTA SAFARI EXTENSION

The 800-mile-long Okavango—the river that never finds the sea—is rightfully considered one of the most incredible wilderness sanctuaries in Africa. Its inland delta system is the largest in the world, 8,000 square miles filled with water channels, lagoons, swamps, and islands. Apart from the outstanding beauty of the wetland habitat, this unique area supports and sustains a huge diversity of fauna and flora so that game viewing is excellent throughout the year, with elephants congregating along the lagoons and waterways and impala, wildebeest, red lechwe, zebra, giraffe, sable, and buffalo found on the game-rich floodplains, along with their predators—lion, leopard, cheetah, and hyena. *4 days. CAPE TOWN EXTENSION

The town where modern South Africa was born has a glorious location on the mountainous Cape Peninsula along the blue waters of Table Bay. There is much to see, from Table Mountain to the famous botanical gardens at Kirstenbosch, where 10,000 species are cultivated on 1,000 acres. Close by is Stellenbosch and Franschhoek wine country and the Cape Point Nature Reserve, where the African continent ends.

For those arriving early in the day, you are invited to join an optional sundowner cruise before the Welcome Dinner (departure time from Ilala Lodge is 3:30 pm). Alternatively, you are welcome to enjoy the afternoon at leisure and meet the group at the lodge in the evening for a trip orientation and Welcome Dinner.

On Day 10 a complimentary transfer will be provided from the Victoria Falls River Lodge to the Victoria Falls Airport.

INTERNATIONAL AIR TRAVEL

You are responsible for making your own arrangements for flights to and from Zimbabwe. There are many online consolidators for booking travel, but for more personal help arranging air transport, you can contact Exito Travel at 1-800-655-4053 in the US or 1-800-670-2605 in Canada. They are very adept at putting flight itineraries together, to even the most far-flung places. More information can be found on Exito's website at www.exitotravel.com.

Depending on your routing, it is necessary to depart from the US one or possibly two days prior to Day 1 of the trip itinerary. The name on your airline ticket must match the name on your passport exactly, and your passport must be valid for at least six months after your date of return to the US.

Please do not purchase your tickets until you are confirmed on the trip. Once your tickets have been purchased, please send us a copy of your airline schedule so we can reserve your airport transfers. It is your responsibility to ensure your flight times coordinate with the arrival and departure logistics for this trip.

What the Trip is Like

TRIP LEVEL

This trip is Level 2+ (Easy to Moderate) according to our trip grading system. It can be enjoyed by anyone in reasonably good health. Optional game walks are available.

Average Walking Day

- 1-2 hours
- 1-2 miles
- Flat terrain

How Tough is This Trip?

While we do not see major elevation gain or loss, you need to be able to walk on uneven surfaces and feel comfortable on your feet for up to 2 hours a day..

WEATHER

Generally, Zimbabwe has a mild climate because of its altitude (about 3,000 feet above sea level). In the months of June and July, temperatures are colder (67°-77°F during the day, 40°-45°F at night) so warm jackets and insulating layers are necessary on early morning game drives. In August, the weather warms up a bit (75°-80°F during the day, 45°-55°F at night), and in the months of September and October, temperatures are even warmer (85°-95°F during the day, 60°-77°F at night), so you can pack lighter clothing.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Each of our safari lodges and camps has been meticulously designed to offer all your home comforts, a splash of luxury and an exciting dash of African charm. On top of this, our locations have been carefully selected for two vital reasons; the local communities' dedication to our conservation partnership and their proximity to some of nature's most impressive wonders, from the famous Victoria Falls, to the mighty Zambezi River and Hwange National Park, famed for its thousands of elephants.

CUISINE

While on safari, breakfasts and evening meals are served at the lodge you are staying in. Lunches while traveling between destinations will be served picnic-style en route. Bottled water, soft drinks, juice, house wine, and beer are included throughout the trip. All vehicles are equipped with a fridge or cool box stocked with bottled water. Tea and coffee are offered by all accommodations free of charge with meals and at afternoon teatime.

TRANSPORTATION

On safari, there are long driving days over rugged dirt tracks, we can be in and out of the vehicles all day long, usually only driving approximately 2 hours at a time. We will be in a 7-seat open sided 4WD vehicle with a roof for sun protection. We sit 6 people max per vehicle to optimize everyone's view and provide wool blankets for early morning and evening game drives.

This is a truly unique safari in that we will be traveling by many different forms of transportation—we will take a vintage train car on safari for 2 hours, a sunset boat cruise for 2 hours, and an optional canoe ride for 2 hours.

SAFETY

During drives and game walks, we can get quite close to wild animals at times. Being very quiet improves everybody's chances of observation. In the interest of safety, your Trip Leader explains limitations on movement while on game drives, on walks, and around camp. Incidents with wild animals are extremely rare on safaris, but no safari can guarantee immunity from such incidents. Wilderness Travel is not to be held responsible for incidents involving the behavior of wildlife.

Community and Conservation

Along with our Zimbabwean partners, WT is deeply committed to the interconnected relationship between responsible tourism, local communities, and conservation. We strongly believe that tourism can be a force for good—to provide employment and sustainable income for local communities, which then in turn promotes the conservation of the local wildlife and natural resources.

COMMUNITY LODGES – BRINGING TOURISM, COMMUNITY, AND WILDLIFE TOGETHER

One of the lodges we have selected in Zimbabwe (Camelthorn Lodge) is built on communal land bordering the national park. By supporting this lodge, our tourism dollars go directly to the local villages, creating employment opportunities (over 100 people from the surrounding communities are employed on a long-term basis as guides or camp staff) and directing concession fees and royalties directly to the local councils (not to the central government). Through this effort, the community has a strong stake in wildlife conservation and is much more likely to help deter poachers and tolerate problem animals in their villages.

In addition, the partnership with these local villages provides opportunities for authentic and unscripted cultural experiences with our guests. We are welcomed to a nearby village as visiting friends not just as tourists.

OTHER COMMUNITY AND CONSERVATION INITIATIVES

Here are some examples of the incredible work your tourism dollars help support:

- Zimbabwe School Lunch Program—500 school children receive a hot lunch daily—a total of 40,000 meals during the four hardest and coldest months of each year
- Construction of 11 double classroom blocks accommodating 720 students
- Supply of school stationery, textbooks, and teacher resources to 14 schools in Hwange
- Support and funding for two anti-poaching teams in the form of wages, training, supplies, bedding, tents, and communication equipment.
- Operation of 18 boreholes inside Hwange National Park, pumping 185,000 gallons of water at the peak of dry season, which sustain an estimated 20-25% of Hwange's wildlife and as many as 10,000 elephants alone
